Geachte meneer/mevrouw,

Uw project Shelter City is in goede orde ontvangen. Wij hebben besloten naar aanleiding van uw aanvraag, waarin u een subsidie vraagt voor 2012/2013, u een éénmalige subsidie toe te kennen van maximaal € 50.000,00. Een voorschot op deze subsidie van 90% - zijnde € 45.000,00 - wordt binnenkort op uw rekeningnummer 5.1.1.c overgemaakt.

De gemeente Den Haag ondersteunt het Shelter City initiatief van harte maar zal niet actief in het project participeren. In de stuurgroep zullen wij aansluiten als toehoorder.

Het college is bereid van Den Haag een Shelter City te maken gedurende een proefperiode van één jaar, mits voldaan wordt aan de volgende condities:

- De met de organisatie van de Shelter City pilot belaste NGO staat in nauw contact met het Ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken. De NGO stelt een risicoprofiel voor de mensenrechtenverdediger op. Dit risicoprofiel is nodig voor de aanvraag van een noodvisum. In het risicoprofiel wordt zorgvuldig onderbouwd dat de persoon een mensenrechtenverdediger is, verblijf buiten eigen land nodig is, de aard van de bedreigingen, waarom het verblijf tijdelijk van aard is én dat gewaarborgd kan worden dat betrokken terugkeert naar het eigen land;
- Het Ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken adviseert het Ministerie van Immigratie en Asiel/ IND over de mensenrechtenaspecten van de visumaanvraag. De IND beslist uiteindelijk definitief over afgifte van een visum;
- De gemeente vervult enkel een facilitaire en beperkte financiële rol. De financiering van het gehele project moet rond zijn, voordat er met de uitvoering van het pilotproject gestart kan worden;
- Er wordt gestart met een eenjarig pilotproject. Gedurende dit pilotproject worden vier mensenrechtenverdedigers met een profiel op het gebied van "Vrede en Recht" voor een verblijf van maximaal drie maanden (wettelijke termijn) naar Den Haag gehaald. Daarvan heeft er

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minimaal één het profiel van kunstenaar en/of schrijver;

- Iedere mensenrechtenverdediger zoekt tijdens zijn of haar verblijf actief de verbinding met de stad;
- De vier mensenrechtenverdedigers worden achtereenvolgend naar Nederland gehaald. Na ieder verblijf wordt geëvalueerd. In deze evaluatie wordt onder andere gekeken naar hoe de terugkeer naar het land van herkomst is verlopen;
- Bij het pilotproject is minimaal één in Den Haag gevestigde NGO én het maatschappelijk middenveld betrokken;
- De uitvoering van het pilotproject ligt bij een Haagse NGO die hiervoor de capaciteit en de kennis heeft. Hierbij wordt gedacht aan Justitia et Pax. Voor wat betreft de opvang van de mensenrechtenverdediger met het profiel kunstenaar en/of schrijver wordt gedacht aan Kosmopolis.
- Na één jaar wordt het pilotproject afgesloten met een algehele evaluatie.

II. Daarbij de volgende doelen na te streven:

- Opvang en bescherming van mensenrechtenverdedigers;
- Capaciteitsopbouw van mensenrechtenverdedigers;
- Versterken van het imago van Nederland als voorvechter van mensenrechten;
- Versterken van het imago van Den Haag als stad van Vrede en Recht;
- Betrokkenheid bij en bewustwording van Hagaars over mensenrechten bevorderen

Wij maken u er op attent dat de Haagse Kader verordening Subsidieverstrekking van toepassing is op deze subsidie. Wij verzoeken u binnen drie maanden na afloop van het project een inhoudelijk verslag en een specificatie van de gemaakte kosten te sturen, voorzien van de (originele) uitgavenbonnen. Na ontvangst hiervan zullen wij de subsidie definitief vaststellen en de resterende 10% van het subsidiebedrag, te weten € 51.1.0 aan uw organisatie overmaken.

Bij een totaal van meer dan € 100.000,00 aan subsidies per boekjaar van de gemeente Den Haag behoort tot de te overleggen documenten een verklaring van getrouwheid van een registeraccountant of van een accountant-administratieconsulent met certificerende bevoegdheid. U kunt van de Bestuursdienst nog richtlijnen en/of een controleprotocol ontvangen waarin een en ander is uitgewerkt.

Tevens attenderen wij u er op dat de HKS vanaf 1 januari 2010 is gewijzigd in aansluiting op de Wet openbaarmaking uit publieke middelen gefinancierde topinkomens(Wopt). In artikel 10, vijfde lid, van de HKS is opgenomen dat subsidieontvangers waarop artikel 6 van de Wopt van toepassing is, uiterlijk op 1 juli de gegevens en de motivering zoals bedoelt in het eerste tot en met vijfde lid van artikel 6 van de Wopt ook bij de gemeente dienen aan te leveren. Het bestuur van de gemeente Den Haag is van mening dat gesubsidieerde instellingen aan hun functionarissen niet meer zouden moeten betalen dan de norm genoemd in de Wopt.

Betreft: Tussentijdse Evaluatie Shelter City

Geachte mevrouw De Jong,

Sinds [redacted] voert Justitia et Pax voor de gemeente Den Haag het Shelter City Initiatief uit. Gedurende deze pilotperiode worden er in totaal [redacted] voor drie maanden opgevangen. Inmiddels hebben [redacted] een verblijf in Den Haag achter de rug. [redacted] na een verblijf van 3 maanden, [redacted] teruggaan naar het land van herkomst. Hoewel het project dus officieel pas in midden november volledig geëvalueerd kan worden, kan Justitia et Pax wel een overzicht geven van hoe het project tot nu toe verlopen is.

Justitia et Pax heeft in het afgelopen jaar intensief samengewerkt met het ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken. Deze betrokkenheid toonde zich voornamelijk in de selectie van de mensenrechtenverdedigers en de bemiddeling in het visumbescheiden. Zo verspreidde het ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken aan organisaties en ambassades het bericht dat het Shelter City Initiatief plaatsvond, ging zij de achtergrond na van mensenrechtenverdedigers die zich hadden aangemeld én nam zij deel aan de selectiecommissie die de deelnemers aan het project bepaalden. Tenslotte droeg het ministerie er ook zorg voor dat het visum snel werd uitgegeven.

Het pilotproject Shelter City: Den Haag had een open inschrijving: er werd bij ambassades en (Nederlandse en internationale) Ngo's de oproep verspreidt van het bestaan van het project en dat bedreigde mensenrechtenverdedigers zich bij Justitia et Pax konden melden. Als een mensenrechtenverdediger zich had aangemeld werd door middel van een vragenlijst een intake afgenumen. Hierbij werd de persoonlijke situatie, het mensenrechtenwerk en het risico van dit werk in kaart gebracht. Daarbij werd ook nagegaan of de mensenrechtenverdediger na drie maanden terug zou kunnen keren naar het land van herkomst. Deze informatie werd vervolgens gecheckt bij ambassades en Ngo's. Alleen als beiden het verhaal van de MRV konden onderschrijven was de persoon in kwestie een serieuze kandidaat.

De samenwerking met het ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken wordt door Justitia et Pax als erg waardevol gezien. Justitia et Pax is dan ook erg verheugd met het feit dat het ministerie heeft toegezegd dat zij de pilot wil doorzetten in een project dat loopt van 2014 tot 2016, waarbij zij het project zowel financieel als inhoudelijk wil blijven ondersteunen. Daarnaast hebben ook andere gemeenten te kennen gegeven dat zij ook geïnteresseerd zijn in het Shelter City Project. Dit zou

betekenen dat een continuering van het project, met een ongeveer gelijke strekking, in Den Haag en andere Nederlandse steden voor het ministerie en Justitia et Pax mogelijk is.

De gemeente Den Haag speelde zelf ook een rol in het pilot project; behalve dat zij het project financieel ondersteunden nam er ook iemand van de gemeente als toehoorder zitting in de selectiecommissie. Zo was de gemeente constant op de hoogte van aankomende en vertrekkende mensenrechtenverdedigers, en wat het verhaal en de achtergrond van deze mensen was.

Nadat een mensenrechtenverdediger terugkeerde naar het land van herkomst heeft Justitia et Pax regelmatig contact gehad met hem of haar. Zoals in de voortgangsrapportage van ^{5.1.2.h} viel te lezen was dit in het geval van de eerste Shelter City kandidaat van groot belang én effectief. Ook de Shelter City kandidaten die later aan het programma deelnamen werden na terugkeer gevuld.

Al deze mensenrechtenverdedigers kwamen naar Den Haag voor bescherming, om op te adem komen. Behalve dat heeft het programma hen door middel van cursussen en bijeenkomsten ook veel nieuwe kennis en contacten mee kunnen geven. Kennis en contacten die teruggekeerde mensenrechtenverdedigers gebruiken in hun dagelijks werk en delen met collega's.

Naast het volgen van cursussen en het opbouwen van een netwerk op professioneel of politiek terrein, is er ook aandacht geweest voor het contact met de inwoners van Den Haag. Zo zijn er door


Justitia et Pax in het [§ 1:2:h] bijeenkomsten voor scholieren en geïnteresseerden georganiseerd, waarbij zij kennis konden maken met de mensenrechtenverdedigers, hun werk en hun levensverhaal. Ook hebben mensenrechtenverdedigers gesproken [§ 1:2:h]. Deze bijeenkomsten werden zowel door [§ 1:2:h] en geïnteresseerden, maar vooral ook door de mensenrechtenverdedigers zelf erg gewaardeerd.



Als internationale NGO met 45 jaar ervaring heeft Justitia et Pax een uitgebreid netwerk opgebouwd met zowel internationale organisaties als lokale NGO's op 'grassroots' niveau. Dankzij dit netwerk kan Justitia et Pax die MRV's identificeren die bedreigd worden vanwege hun werk en van wie Justitia et Pax weet dat zij aan alle voorwaarden voor deelnamen aan het project voldoen, waaronder de terugkeer naar het eigen land. Justitia et Pax benaderde de volgende organisaties en personen voor het aandragen van kandidaten:

Bij de aanvang van het project ontving Justitia et Pax minder aanmeldingen dan verwacht. Het feit dat het een nieuw en onbekend project was heeft hier deels mee te maken. Daarnaast had het vermoedelijk ook te maken met de periode van de start van het project. Het groene licht werd in [REDACTED] gegeven en het project werd officieel in [REDACTED] gestart. In deze zomerperiode bleek het moeilijk om organisaties te vinden die meezaagden. [REDACTED] nam de vraag dan ook zienderogen toe. Dit was zeker het geval toen het project eenmaal een tijd liep en naamsbekendheid voor zichzelf had opgebouwd. [REDACTED] ontvangt Justitia et Pax gemiddeld één serieuse aanmelding per [REDACTED]. Als dit doorzet zou Justitia et Pax ongeveer [REDACTED] aanvragen per jaar ontvangen naast de aanvragen die zij krijgt op het moment dat er daadwerkelijk gezocht wordt naar Shelter City kandidaten.

Justitia et Pax was het centrale aanmeldpunt waar MRV's zichzelf of via een organisatie konden aanmelden voor Shelter City opvang. Door middel van een take-in bepaalde Justitia et Pax vervolgens of de MRV voldeed aan de voorwaarden van het Shelter City project. Deze voorwaarden waren:

- Dat de MRV (ernstig) bedreigd werd.
- Dat de MRV na 3 maanden terug kon keren naar het land van herkomst.
- Dat de MRV in staat was om zich uit te spreken over de mensenrechtensituatie in het land van herkomst.
- Dat de uitvoering van het project en de zichtbaarheid van de mensenrechtenverdediger gedurende zijn/haar verblijf niet ten koste gaat van de veiligheid van de MRV en zijn/haar familie in het thuisland en/of van de terugkeermogelijkheden van de MRV.

Naast de take-in werden ook NGO's en Europese vertegenwoordigingen geconsulteerd met de vraag of zij bekend zijn met de MRV en zijn/haar werk. Als de MRV en zijn/haar werk bekend was en geschikt werd bevonden, werd het Ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken geconsulteerd. In deze consultatie werd gevraagd of de ambassade van het ministerie in het desbetreffende land bekend was met de MRV en zijn/haar werk. Ook werd er nagegaan of de dreiging die de MRV ontving reëel was en hoe deze verbonden is aan het werk van de MRV. Pas na deze consultatie van het Ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken was de MRV een mogelijke kandidaat voor Shelter City.

Onderdeel van het initiatiefvoorstel van de gemeente Den Haag was dat de mensenrechtenverdediger in contact zou komen met de lokale bevolking van Den Haag. In gesprekken met de gemeente ging de voorkeur uit naar Engelssprekende MRV's. Dit zou gesprekken met scholieren, studenten en geïnteresseerden makkelijker moeten maken.

In de praktijk blijkt het echter erg lastig om het Engels als voorkeur te stellen. In veel gebieden waar mensenrechten worden geschonden is Engels geen veel voorkomende taal en het zou vreemd zijn als deze mensen, die het echt nodig hebben, niet in aanmerking zouden komen voor het project enkel en alleen omdat zij de Engelse taal niet spreken. Daarnaast is beheersing van het Engels ook moeilijk te controleren. Communicatie vooraf aan de opvangperiode gaat vaak via email, waarmee de MRV zijn Engels beter kan laten voordoen dan dat deze in werkelijkheid is.

Justitia et Pax heeft bovendien in de praktijk geen problemen ondervonden met MRV's die

Shelter City draait om persoonlijke rust en veiligheid en de mogelijkheden om persoonlijk te groeien. Het verbinden van grass roots mensenrechtenverdedigers met Europese of Nederlandse politici is een goede tool om deze doelen te bereiken. Het direct in contact brengen van de MRV met de politicus heeft voordelen voor beide partijen. De politicus heeft een direct link en informatiebron binnen een bepaald gebied en over een bepaald onderwerp en de MRV heeft de mogelijkheid om politieke ruchtbaarheid te geven aan mensenrechtenschendingen en/of de veiligheidssituatie van de MRV.

Shelter City bleek goed in staat om de mensenrechtenverdedigers die in Den Haag werden opgevangen een platform te bieden in Nationale media. Bijna alle mensenrechtenverdedigers hebben, zolang de veiligheidssituatie het toeliet, een interview in één of meerdere media gehad. Hierbij kan gedacht worden aan kranten (*Trouw*, *NRC*)³, vak of weekbladen (*Vice Versa*,

Tot slot heeft het een bijdrage geleverd aan een conferentie § 12h en lokaal beleid: hierin trokken Buitenlandse Zaken en Justitia et Pax samen op.

Lessons learned:

Justitia et Pax kan spreken van een succesvolle pilotperiode voor het project. Toch zijn er tijdens deze pilotperiode een aantal knelpunten vastgesteld, waar in een vervolg van het project een andere invulling voor zal worden gevonden:

1. Voorkeur van de Engelse Taal

Onderdeel van het initiatiefvoorstel van de gemeente Den Haag was dat de mensenrechtenverdediger in contact zou komen met de lokale bevolking van Den Haag. In gesprekken met de gemeente ging de voorkeur uit naar Engelssprekende MRV's. Dit zou gesprekken met scholieren, studenten en geïnteresseerden makkelijker moeten maken.

In de praktijk blijkt het echter erg lastig om het Engels als voorkeur te stellen. In veel gebieden waar mensenrechten worden geschonden is Engels geen veel voorkomende taal en het zou vreemd zijn als deze mensen, die het echt nodig hebben, niet in aanmerking zouden komen voor het project enkel en alleen omdat zij de Engelse taal niet spreken. Daarnaast is beheersing van het Engels ook moeilijk te controleren. Communicatie vooraf aan de opvangperiode gaat vaak via email, waarmee de MRV zijn Engels beter kan laten voordoen dan dat deze in werkelijkheid is.

Justitia et Pax heeft bovendien in de praktijk geen problemen ondervonden met MRV's die geen of slecht Engels spreken. Zelfs een MRV die slecht Engels sprak en daarnaast enkel Russisch, heeft in Den Haag goede opvang kunnen vinden. Om deze reden heeft de adviescommissie, in overleg met de gemeente, besloten om de voorkeur voor het Engels te laten vallen. In de praktijk blijkt een vertaler goed te vinden en doet het niet kunnen spreken van de Engelse taal niets af aan de kwaliteit van het verblijf in Den Haag. Ook voor Frans- en Spaanstaligen was gemakkelijk begeleiding en vertaling te vinden.

Om deze reden raadt Justitia et Pax aan om de voorkeur van het spreken van Engels in een vervolg van het Shelter City project te schrappen of de voorwaarde van talen te verruimen naar Engels, Spaans en Frans. Hiermee zal de reikwijdte van het project toenemen zonder dat het afdoet aan de mogelijkheid om de gestelde doelstellingen te behalen.

Ten tweede beperkt een dergelijke voorwaarde de keuzevrijheid van de adviescommissie en/of de vrijheid van Justitia et Pax om de keuze over te nemen. Tijdens de pilot bleek het mogelijk voor de commissie 5.1.2.b te kiezen, maar dit zou toeval kunnen zijn.

Om deze redenen is het aan te raden geen bepaalde professionele criteria te stellen aan de kandidaten, behalve dat zij MRV's zijn. Uiteraard zal Justitia et Pax de oproep voor MRV's zo breed mogelijk uitzetten, zodat ook niet traditionele mensenrechtenverdedigers zoals 5.1.2.b en 5.1.2.b de kans hebben zich hierop in te schrijven.



3. Medische en psychologische zorg

De opzet van het Shelter City initiatief is dat het zich richt op de opvang en rust van bedreigde MRV's. Het bieden van bepaalde medische behandelingen is in deze opzet geen doel op zich. Dit neemt echter niet weg dat de MRV's terwijl zij in Nederland zijn gebruik zullen maken van de medische voorzieningen. Hoewel de opgevangen Shelter City kandidaten een zorgverzekering hebben zal deze –zo blijkt uit ervaring- niet elke noodzakelijke behandeling vergoeden. Ook zullen sommige MRV's vanwege de geuite bedreigingen willen spreken met een psycholoog. Ook deze sessies worden niet vergoed door de zorgverzekering, maar vallen –zo vindt Justitia et Pax- wel onder de noodzakelijke voorzieningen van een goede opvang van een bedreigde MRV. Om deze reden stelt Justitia et Pax voor om voor elke Shelter City kandidaat een bedrag te reserveren voor medische kosten en psychologische zorg, naast de al betaalde zorgverzekering.

4. De periode van de opvang

Tijdens de pilot periode zijn de MRV's gedurende het hele jaar ontvangen. Hoewel dit geen probleem was voor Justitia et Pax als uitnodigende organisatie, bleek dit in de invulling van de verschillende programma's soms problematisch. Dit was voornamelijk het geval tijdens de vakantieperiode. Zo was het niet mogelijk om altijd cursussen te ontvangen die interessant waren voor de MRV's. Ook bleek het lastiger om tijdens ^{5.1.2.h} afspraken voor de verschillende MRV's te regelen bij NGO's of politici in Den Haag en Brussel.

Daarnaast kan het ook voorkomen dat de MRV, hoewel deze dagelijks begeleid wordt, soms wat eenzaam is. Deze problemen zijn te ondervangen door niet langer vier maal één MRV op te vangen, maar door bijvoorbeeld twee maal twee MRV's op te vangen. Op deze wijze kunnen beide paren van MRV's elkaar wellicht ondersteunen en kan worden bevorderd dat alle MRV's in Nederland zijn gedurende een periode waarbij het makkelijker is om een cursus te volgen en afspraken te plannen.

5. Kosten van het project

Het Shelter City Initiatief is een succes geworden dankzij de intensieve begeleiding van de MRV's door Justitia et Pax. Justitia et Pax is van mening dat het project niet zo'n groot succes zou zijn geworden als de MRV's niet werden bijgestaan in het plannen van en het meereizen naar afspraken met NGO's, studenten, media en (lokale)overheden. Ook is de selectie en triage van de aangemelde kandidaten een intensief proces, waarbij veel wordt samengewerkt met buitenlandse ^{5.1.2.h}

project is door Justitia et Pax subsidie aangevraagd bij het ministerie en zij zal dit ook doen bij andere fondsen. Echter, voor continuering van het project zal naast de bijdragen van het Ministerie en van Justitia et Pax en andere fondsen ook van de gemeenten een bijdrage verwacht worden. Zij zijn het immers die zich Shelter City kunnen noemen.

Justitia et Pax heeft ervoor gekozen om alle kosten die niet direct verbonden konden worden aan het lokale project zelf te dragen; zo wordt het bedrag van lokale opvang per mensenrechtenverdediger lager. Echter, hierdoor wordt het bedrag dat Justitia et Pax kan bijdragen aan het lokale project lager. Waar de bijdrage van de gemeenten voor het totaal uitkomt op ongeveer een derde per MRV, wordt de bijdrage in de 'lokale begroting' nu ^{5.1.1.b.8}. De overige ^{5.1.1.b.9}



worden bijgedragen door ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken en Justitia et Pax. Dit resulteert in een bijdrage van de Gemeente voor 5.112 Euro per MRV. Zie voor een volledig overzicht voor dit bedrag de volgende pagina.



Geachte heer/mevrouw,

Uw project Shelter City is in goede orde ontvangen. Wij hebben besloten u voor het project Shelter City Den Haag een éénmalige subsidie toe te kennen van maximaal € 50.000,00 per jaar. Dit voor de duur van uw project voor drie jaar (2014 t/m 2016). Aan de subsidieverlening wordt de voorwaarde verbonden dat Justitia et Pax zich onthoudt van commerciële activiteiten. Per jaar zult u een nieuwe beschikking ontvangen waarmee de subsidie voor dat jaar beschikbaar wordt gesteld. Voor dit bedrag dienen 5124 per jaar (2014, 2015 en 2016) -zo veel mogelijk achtereenvolgend- opgevangen te worden in Den Haag. Eventuele extra kosten voor het project kunnen niet ten laste worden gebracht aan de gemeente Den Haag. Een voorschot op de subsidie voor 2014 van 90% - zijnde € 45.000,00 - wordt binnenkort op uw rekeningnummer 511c overgemaakt.

De gemeente Den Haag ondersteunt het Shelter City initiatief van harte, maar zal niet actief in het project participeren. In de stuurgroep zullen wij aansluiten als toehoorder.

Het college en de raad zijn bereid om van Den Haag een Shelter City te maken gedurende drie jaar (2014, 2015 en 2016), mits voldaan wordt aan de volgende condities:

- Justitia et Pax staat voor de uitvoering van het project in nauw contact met het ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken. De NGO stelt een risicoprofiel voor de mensenrechtenverdediger op. In het risicoprofiel wordt zorgvuldig onderbouwd dat de persoon een mensenrechtenverdediger is, tijdelijk verblijf buiten eigen land nodig is, wat de aard van de bedreigingen is, én dat gewaarborgd kan worden dat betrokken terugkeert naar het eigen land;
- Het Ministerie van Buitenlandse Zaken adviseert de IND over de mensenrechtenaspecten van de visumaanvraag. De IND beslist uiteindelijk definitief over afgifte van een visum;
- De gemeente vervult enkel een facilitaire en financiële rol (€50.000 in 2014, 2015 en 2016). Hiervoor worden door Justitia et Pax jaarlijks minimaal drie mensenrechtenverdedigers -zoveel mogelijk achtereenvolgend- voor een verblijf van maximaal drie maanden (wettelijke termijn) in Den Haag uitgenodigd;
- Iedere mensenrechtenverdediger zoekt tijdens zijn of haar verblijf actief de verbinding met de stad;

- Bij het project is minimaal één in Den Haag gevestigde NGO én het maatschappelijk middenveld betrokken;
- Tijdens het verblijf van de mensenrechtenverdedigers wordt een inhoudelijk programma met publieke optredens en relevante netwerkgelegenheden georganiseerd, zonder daarbij de veiligheid en terugkeermogelijkheden van de mensenrechtenverdediger in gevaar te brengen;
- De subsidie wordt jaarlijks verstrekt;
- Na ieder jaar wordt het project kort geëvalueerd.

Wij maken u er op attent dat de Haagse Kader verordening Subsidieverstrekking van toepassing is op deze subsidie. Wij verzoeken u voor 1 april 2015 een inhoudelijk verslag en een specificatie van de gemaakte kosten te sturen, voorzien van de (originele) uitgavenbonnen. Na ontvangst hiervan zullen wij de subsidie definitief vaststellen en mogelijk de resterende 10% van het jaarlijkse subsidiebedrag, te weten € 5.000,00 aan uw organisatie overmaken.

Bij een totaal van meer dan € 100.000,00 aan subsidies per boekjaar van de gemeente Den Haag behoort tot de te overleggen documenten een verklaring van getrouwheid van een registeraccountant of van een accountant-administratieconsulent met certificerende bevoegdheid. U kunt van de Bestuursdienst nog richtlijnen en/of een controleprotocol ontvangen waarin een en ander nader is uitgewerkt.

Wij attenderen u erop dat de HKS vanaf 1 januari 2013 is gewijzigd in aansluiting op de Wet normering bezoldiging topfunctionarissen publieke en semipublieke sector (WNT). In artikel 10, zevende lid, van de HKS is opgenomen dat de subsidieontvanger waarop de WNT van toepassing is, verplicht is om de bezoldigingsnorm zoals bepaald bij of krachtens deze wet voor een ieder bij de subsidieontvanger in acht te nemen.

CONTROLEVERKLARING VAN DE ONAFHANKELIJK ACCOUNTANT

Verklaring betreffende de jaarrekening

Wij hebben de in dit rapport opgenomen jaarrekening 2014 van Stichting Justice and Peace Netherlands te 's Gravenhage gecontroleerd. Deze jaarrekening bestaat uit de balans per 31 december 2014 en de staat van baten en lasten over 2014 met de toelichting, waarin zijn opgenomen een overzicht van de gehanteerde grondslagen voor financiële verslaggeving en andere toelichtingen.

Verantwoordelijkheid van het bestuur

Het bestuur van de stichting is verantwoordelijk voor het opmaken van de jaarrekening die het vermogen en het resultaat getrouw dient weer te geven. Het bestuur is tevens verantwoordelijk voor de financiële rechtmatigheid van de in de jaarrekening verantwoorde baten, lasten en balansmutaties. Dit houdt in dat deze bedragen in overeenstemming dienen te zijn met de in de relevante wet- en regelgeving opgenomen bepalingen.

Het bestuur is tevens verantwoordelijk voor een zodanige interne beheersing als het noodzakelijk acht om het opmaken van de jaarrekening mogelijk te maken zonder afwijkingen van materieel belang als gevolg van fraude of fouten.

Verantwoordelijkheid van de accountant

Onze verantwoordelijkheid is het geven van een oordeel over de jaarrekening op basis van onze controle. Wij hebben onze controle verricht in overeenstemming met Nederlands recht, waaronder de Nederlandse controlesstandaarden. Dit vereist dat wij voldoen aan de voor ons geldende ethische voorschriften en dat wij onze controle zodanig plannen en uitvoeren dat een redelijke mate van zekerheid wordt verkregen dat de jaarrekening geen afwijkingen van materieel belang bevat.

Een controle omvat het uitvoeren van werkzaamheden ter verkrijging van controle-informatie over de bedragen en de toelichtingen in de jaarrekening. De geselecteerde werkzaamheden zijn afhankelijk van de door de accountant toegepaste oordeelsvorming, met inbegrip van het inschatten van de risico's dat de jaarrekening een afwijking van materieel belang bevat als gevolg van fraude of fouten.

Bij het maken van deze risico-inschattingen neemt de accountant de interne beheersing in aanmerking die relevant is voor het opmaken van de jaarrekening en voor het getrouwe beeld daarvan, alsmede in het kader van de financiële rechtmatigheid voor de naleving van die relevante wet- en regelgeving, gericht op het opzetten van controlewerkzaamheden die passend zijn in de omstandigheden. Deze risico-inschattingen hebben echter niet tot doel een oordeel tot uitdrukking te brengen over de effectiviteit van de interne beheersing van de stichting. Een

controle omvat tevens het evalueren van de geschiktheid van de gebruikte grondslagen voor financiële verslaggeving en de gebruikte financiële rechtmatigheidscriteria en van de redelijkheid van de door het bestuur van de stichting gemaakte schattingen, alsmede een evaluatie van het algehele beeld van de jaarrekening.

Wij zijn van mening dat de door ons verkregen controle-informatie voldoende en geschikt is om een onderbouwing voor ons oordeel te bieden.

Naar ons oordeel geeft de jaarrekening een getrouw beeld van de grootte en samenstelling van het vermogen van Stichting Justice and Peace Netherlands per 31 december 2014 en van het resultaat over 2014.

In 2014 the Shelter City Initiative transformed from a local pilot project into a national programme in which multiple cities take part. The programme started with two cities; The Hague and Middelburg; that provided shelter ^{5.1.2h} In 2015, after a successful lobby campaign, Justice and Peace Netherlands is now cooperating with five cities (The Hague, Middelburg, Utrecht, Nijmegen, Maastricht), capable of sheltering a total of ^{5.1.2h} for this year; later this year three other cities (Amsterdam, Tilburg and Groningen) might join our Shelter City Initiative. With these expansions, Justice and Peace Netherlands will be able to shelter more HRDs and achieve the goal of sheltering ^{5.1.2h}

While the temporary relocation of the HRDs is the main goal, the programme also tries to create awareness on the necessity of human rights and knowledge on human rights violations with the citizens of the Shelter Cities. In light of this, Justice and Peace Netherlands organised meetings at Humanity House as well as universities and schools. Both the HRDs and the audience responded very positively to the meetings.

1. NARRATIVE REPORT

1.1. Introduction

In 2014, the Shelter City Initiative started as a national project. The programme started in 2014 with only two cities, The Hague and Middelburg, capable of sheltering 10 Human Rights Defenders. In 2015, after a successful lobby campaign, Justice and Peace started cooperation with six cities (The Hague, Middelburg, Utrecht, Amsterdam, Nijmegen and Maastricht). The Shelter City Initiative was then able to shelter 20 HRDs. This year (2016), Groningen and Tilburg have also joined the Initiative. With these expansions, Justice and Peace Netherlands will be able to shelter more HRDs and achieve the goal of sheltering 30 HRDs in 3 years.




1.2. Main results

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Inleiding

Het financieel jaarverslag 2016 is een verslag dat duidelijk laat zien dat de ruimte en (financiële) steun voor kleine en middelgrote mensenrechtenorganisaties in het algemeen kleiner begint te worden. Dit heeft in eerste instantie te maken met het kleiner wordend totale budget voor de sector (en specifiek activiteiten op het terrein van mensenrechten en sociale gerechtigheid) en de nog altijd groeiende concurrentie. De verdere eisen die gesteld worden aan organisaties beperken kleinere organisaties in waar zij hun fondsen kunnen aanvragen. De voorwaarden zijn steeds vaker onmogelijk te vervullen door limieten in budget, menskracht die nodig is om een aanvraag in te dienen of andere voorwaarden aan de organisatie, bijv. additionele eisen bovenop ISO-certificering die niet haalbaar zijn voor een middelgrote organisatie als Justice and Peace.


Ondanks deze uitdagingen bouwt Justice and Peace aan een solide organisatie die meer naamsbekendheid krijgt en ook positieve ontwikkelingen te melden heeft op financieel gebied. Dit laatste is vooral te danken aan de enorme inspanning m.b.t. fondsenwerving voor de verschillende programma's, in het bijzonder Shelter City en Welkom Hier. De positieve resultaten die zijn behaald dragen bij aan de financiële stabiliteit en zekerheid van het programma Shelter City tot begin 2020. Wij hebben ons tot doel gesteld dit ook te realiseren voor de The Hague Training Course en het Welkom Hier programma voor de komende jaren. Hierbij is het het vermelden waard dat de eerste stappen zijn gezet voor Welkom Hier door het tekenen van een contract rond het project ' Welkom hier Den Haag ' met Fonds1818 voor 2016-18. Om deze zekerheid te behalen voor ons gehele programma achten we investeringen in alle genoemde programma's noodzakelijk en daarom hebben we in 2016 veel geïnvesteerd in ontwikkel- en communicatiekosten om onze zichtbaarheid te vergroten, zowel digitaal als met aantrekkelijke PR-materialen.

Net als in 2015 geldt nog altijd dat minder opbrengsten zijn binnen gehaald in 2016 dan gepland. De hogere kosten zijn gekoppeld aan het organiseren van de The Hague Defenders Days en de ondersteuning van de programma's, waaronder Welkom Hier en Shelter City, op het terrein van communicatie. Deze kosten zal de organisatie voor eigen rekening nemen. Verder is het goed op te merken dat projecten gekoppeld aan trainingen in landen als de Democratische Republiek Congo en Bangladesh in 2016 zijn afgesloten. De organisatie ziet ook in 2016 wederom een grote inzet van stagiaires en vrijwilligers en een substantiële investering in deskundigheidsbevordering van het relatief jonge personeelsbestand. Dit alles heeft tot gevolg dat er een directe ontwikkeling te zien is van onze nieuwe programma's en ideeën in de twee programma's. Ondanks de uitdagingen voor Justice and Peace, maar dankzij de inspanningen van de staf, heeft de organisatie het negatief saldo kunnen beperken tot een bedrag van 5.116,-. Desalniettemin zien we dat de investeringen zich beginnen uit te betalen in de vorm van naamsbekendheid; meer organisaties benaderen ons en willen met ons samenwerken of gebruik maken van onze expertise op het gebied van trainingen. Dit geeft moed om op de ingeraden weg door te gaan in 2017 en daarna.

Zo kunnen we meer mensen betrekken bij het belangrijke werk van mensenrechtenverdedigers en concreet laten zien wat deze bijzondere groep mensen bijdraagt aan vrede, recht en rechtvaardigheid.

INTRODUCTION

Since September 2012, Justice and Peace has been implementing the Shelter City Initiative in The Hague, in partnership with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the municipality. The idea is to offer a shelter to human rights defenders (HRDs) whose lives are threatened and who face intense pressure in their country of origin due to their work. The Shelter City Initiative found its origins and justification in the need directly voiced by Justice and Peace's local partners to have a place where to find respite from their intense work and to escape when needed. The Initiative also met policy objectives at national,¹ European,² and international³ levels. Today, the need to support HRDs remains acute, as shown by the growing number of applications received during each call for the Shelter City Initiative.

The City of The Hague pioneered the idea, being the first Shelter City to welcome HRDs under the Initiative. Over the years, a growing number of cities joined, all of them convinced by the success and necessity of the project. Today, eight cities have become part of the project. Beyond the rise in number of HRDs hosted, Justice and Peace has worked to improve the quality of the programme for the participants, especially in The Hague, where HRDs are hosted in our office. HRDs have received increasingly professional support in terms of managing their security (training, analysis, plans), medical and psychological follow-up, networking, etc.

A crucial aspect of the Shelter City initiative is the connection it makes between the global and local levels, through the contribution of the municipality to the furtherance of international human rights and the individual linkage between HRDs from all over the world and Dutch cities. The Hague is in that sense ideally positioned. As the city of peace and justice and hub for international organisations, it offers a lot of opportunities for HRDs. On the other hand, the Shelter City Initiative offers ways to engage citizens on human rights issues. Human rights is a broad topic that can be approached from different angles, and Shelter City has the unique potential to create synergies between different actors in the city (such as schools, universities and research institutes, local initiatives, human rights organisations, or just interested citizens). The creation of a volunteer network and human rights education are some of the ways in which these actors can be brought together.

In the coming three years, Justice and Peace will continue to host and support HRDs, building up on the successes and experience it accumulated since 2012. Justice and Peace will particularly focus on further increasing its professionalism in the support it gives to human rights defenders, as well as providing more visibility and local support to the project within the city of The Hague. It will also introduce more flexibility by accepting HRDs on a rolling basis, and for more flexible periods of time (with a maximum kept at 90 days). The budget (see annex) has been drafted taking into account those elements, as well as the expenses effectively made in the past years.

PROJECT STRONG POINTS

- The project contributes to foster human rights worldwide by directly supporting those who work to improve these rights worldwide, at the expense of their own life.
- The project offers young people, together with the general public of The Hague, the possibility to receive first-hand information about the importance of human rights, democracy and the work of human rights defenders. Through debate and encounter with HRDs, they can develop informed opinion on those topics.
- The project makes human rights come alive, concrete and manageable. In consequence of this fact, the target groups behave and act as global citizens.
- The project has received and will continue to receive media coverage and public attention, highlighting the role of The Hague as city of peace and justice and giving it a specific identity as a city for human rights. Those who make a change in the field of peace and Justice; human rights defenders.
- The project will encourage new synergies and cooperation between different actors in the city who are not usually working together.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PROJECT

1. SHELTER AND SUPPORT HUMAN RIGHTS DEFENDERS

Objective 1: Shelter and support human rights defenders in The Hague and provide them with resources to continue their work after return

Expected results

- 3 to 6 HRDs per year receive guidance and logistic support during their stay in The Hague for a maximum period of 3 months.
- 3-6 HRDs per year receive medical and/or psychological support when needed.
- Support is provided to HRDs who cannot return because their security situation has worsened.

Activities

- Provide logistic and practical support.
- Provide medical and psychological support.
- Provide support in case an emergency situation prevents the HRD from returning home.

1.1. Logistic support is provided to 3-6 HRDs per year

Justice and Peace will continue to host at least 3 HRDs per year, selected through the Shelter City Selection Committee composed of representatives of the Foreign Affairs Ministry and NGOs (Free Press Unlimited and Hivos) and chaired by a professor in Human Rights Law from the University of Amsterdam. Thanks to its multilingual staff, Justice and Peace is able to host English, French and Spanish-speaking HRDs. This is a great asset for Shelter City The Hague, as language is a barrier for

many human rights defenders across the globe. Translation is then provided during meetings and public events. The HRD has a work space at Justice and Peace's office. The costs for travel to and within the Netherlands, insurance, accommodation costs and a monthly stipend are provided.

In the coming years, Justice and Peace wants to learn from its experience and improve the programme by giving it more flexibility. The relatively strict timing with which we are able to host HRDs indeed excludes many of them from receiving help under the programme. More particularly, we are only open to applications a couple of weeks per year during the calls and we offer a standard 3-month stay. This means that we cannot answer the many requests we receive outside the call openings, nor accept HRDs who just need a short rest (a month for instance) outside of their country but cannot afford to be away from their field work or families for too long.

As the host organization in the city of The Hague and lead organization of the Shelter City Initiative, we would like to pioneer a new, more flexible system for Shelter City The Hague by hosting max. another 3 HRDs at risk through:

- answering demands we receive from partner organisations worldwide on a rolling basis instead of strictly within calls. Each application will continue to be submitted to the Selection Committee for review and approval, and reference checks will continue to be performed. Note that the fact that applications would be received through partners and not through an open call is an additional guarantee that candidates are adequate and have a backing from their organisations.
- enabling shorter, rest and respite stays for HRDs who urgently need time out of their countries but cannot afford to stay 3 months away from the field or families. This should also make the programme more gender-sensitive, as mothers are often put off by the idea of having to leave their children behind for such a long time.

90 days would remain the maximum period of time. When an HRD stays for a shorter period, this would thus leave some room for another short stay (for instance, in one year, we could host 2 HRDs for 90 days, one for 30 days and one for 60 days). In total, the number of days per year where HRDs will be hosted will not be higher than originally planned (i.e. 3 x 90 days, thus 270 days in total). Hosting one HRD at a time will remain the norm, although a certain degree of overlap is possible. In any case, there would never be more than two HRDs hosted at the same time.

1.2. Medical and psychological support, when needed, is provided to hosted HRDs

Medical and psychological support will continue to be offered to HRDs when needed, as this is an essential part of their rest time here. Check-up with a doctor is part of the intake. Experience has also underlined the importance of the psychological component, even for HRDs who are not directly traumatized. All of them have been through very harsh experiences and faced threats, sometimes even attacks, which can lead to trauma. Cooperation with specialized psychologists is therefore crucial. Psychological security and how to better deal with psychological side-effects of their work is also an aspect which is discussed during the training provided by Justice and Peace, and with the HRDs during their stay.

1.3. Support in case of emergency situation (HRD cannot leave)

Because of the work they do and the context they come from, it can happen that unexpected events directly affect the situation of an HRD during his/her stay in The Hague. In that case, Justice and Peace supports the HRD in making the security analysis and devising alternative plans for the future. The stay of the HRD can be extended for a maximal period of three months, during which basic support will continue to be provided (accommodation, livelihood and travel).

NB: For the budget lines corresponding to this activity, as well as for costs reserved for medical and psychological costs, the costs will not necessarily be made. In order to avoid being short on budget to cover those costs (which can be high if they must be made), Justice and Peace offers the possibility to all Shelter Cities to participate in an emergency fund. For each guest, 3100€ are transferred by the municipality on a separate bank account. This collective amount of money is used in case unexpected medical or psychological costs which are not covered by the insurance must be made, or if the HRD has to stay longer for security reasons. At the end of the contract period, unused money is send back to the cities.

2. STRENGTHEN HUMAN RIGHTS DEFENDERS

Objective 2: Provide sheltered human rights defenders with appropriate resources to continue their work after return

Expected results

- Hosted HRDs extend their professional network in The Netherlands and Europe and thereby attract attention for the situation in their country, strengthen their international profile and thereby their security.
- 3 HRDs per year follow language courses, human rights courses or any other course which can help them improve their work after they return.
- All hosted HRDs follow trainings on digital, physical and psychological security, thanks to which they are able to work in a safer way and share new knowledge with their colleagues after their return.
- At least 2 HRDs per year receive security, lobby and advocacy training and network with HRDs worldwide during the The Hague Training Course for Human Rights Defenders.

Activities

- Support the HRD in networking and lobbying in The Netherlands, Brussels and Geneva
- Provide appropriate courses and trainings (such as language courses, human rights, advocacy, etc.) through cooperation with other organizations, universities or schools
- Provide security trainings, including through participation in the The Hague Training Course for Human Rights Defenders.

2.1. Networking and lobby

Broadening their network is very important for HRDs while in The Netherlands. It enables them to not only create new partnerships and attract attention on their work, but also to increase their own security by being embedded in an international network that can be called upon if they are in trouble after their return to their home country.

The Hague is a hub for international organisations and NGOs working in peace and justice, but also the seat of the national government and institutions. This makes it a good place for HRDs to extend their network. When necessary, Justice and Peace also introduces HRDs to relevant institutions outside The Hague, such as in Brussels. In this way, awareness about the human rights situation in the regions where the HRD works is increased through the sharing of information with Dutch and EU NGOs, politicians and decision-makers.

Broadening the network of the HRD is thus not only beneficial for him or her, but also for other actors such as Dutch politicians who receive first-hand information on the human rights situation in the country of origin of the HRD.

2.2. Training

The Shelter City Initiative aims at having a long-term impact for the participants, and through them, on the human rights situation they are trying to improve back home. Increasing their capacities is crucial in order to enable HRDs to perform their work in a better and safer way after they return to their countries.

Since the beginning of the project, HRDs have been able to follow **language courses, courses on human rights or any other course relevant to the work they do**. In the coming years, Justice and Peace will deepen the collaboration with higher education institutes (The Hague Campus, ISS, Haagse Hogeschool, KABK, etc.) so that HRDs can follow human rights, international law and other courses.

Justice and Peace will continue to provide security trainings covering physical, digital and psychological aspects of security to the HRDs hosted. Each HRD will follow at least one “**mini-training**” of 2 days, focused on working under dangerous conditions (3 mini-trainings per year). The human rights defenders who are hosted during the **The Hague Training Courses** for Human Rights Defenders on Security (THTC) (2 per year), organised by Justice and Peace, will be able to take part in it. Justice and Peace started with this course in 2014 and organizes two such courses a year with great success. It provides HRDs with a strong set of skills to improve their security after return as well as lobby and advocacy skills. Networking and sharing experience with other HRDs is also essential, as it creates a peer network of HRDs all over the world, in which to draw inspiration and support. Enabling the Shelter City participants to take part in the THTC will strengthen the long-term impact of the project by providing HRDs with the necessary tools to work in a safer and more efficient way.

3. LOCAL OUTREACH AND CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT

Objective 3: Citizens and students in The Hague gain nuanced knowledge and awareness on human rights issues through contacts and exchanges with hosted HRDs

Expected results

- *Minimum 300 MBO and HBO students, 200 university students and 400 members of the public per year will be taught about human rights and meet and debate with a HRD.*
- *A volunteers working group is established and meets at least 6 times a year to organise activities and events with the hosted HRDs.*
- *1000 people per month will visit the Shelter City Platform, Justice and Peace website or Facebook page and be informed about HRDs, human rights and the Shelter City Initiative.*

Activities

- *Develop information and education material.*
- *Prepare and facilitate events/lectures for The Hague students and citizens.*
- *Set up and coordinate the volunteers working group.*
- *Maintain and update the online platform and website.*

One of the objectives of Justice and Peace through the Shelter City Initiative is to increase citizens' and students' awareness of human rights. The implementation of the Shelter City Initiative in the city provides good avenues to bring the international concept of human rights in a local, municipal context and link this theoretic ideal to a specific person: the threatened human rights defender. In the coming three years, Justice and Peace will use three main tools to reach this objective: a human rights education programme, the Shelter City Volunteers Working Group, and the Shelter City online platform.

3.1. Human rights education

In a globalized world it is often assumed that everyone is aware of the problems that take place thousands of kilometres from here. However, this is often only true for a small part of the society. The majority of the population has no basic knowledge about human rights issues. Yet, those issues are frequently the subject of public and political debates and what happens elsewhere has, more than ever, an impact on their daily lives of people here (the refugee crisis is a good example). Students and the general public can greatly benefit from engaging in discussions and conversations on the topic. Besides providing the target groups with a general understanding of human rights (violations), meeting directly with human rights defenders will make the global, broad and complex problem of human rights violations more local, concrete and manageable. It is also an invitation to reflect upon how human rights are applied in The Netherlands.

With the educational program, Justice and Peace focuses on four target groups:

- MBO students
- HBO students
- University students
- The general public in The Hague

With three human rights defenders hosted in The Hague every year, Justice and Peace aims to reach the following numbers on an annual basis:

- Minimum 300 MBO and HBO students from the Hague area (minimum 5 lessons per year)
- Minimum 200 university students (minimum 3 lectures per year)
- Minimum 400 members of the public (minimum 4 public events per year)

In addition, it is likely that human rights defenders will be the subject of one or more articles in local national newspapers or radios, as it has been in the past. The media coverage will make a wide audience aware of the challenging and difficult circumstances under which human rights defenders have to do their work, will generate more attention for the Shelter City Initiative in The Hague and will also underline the role of The Hague as city of peace and justice.

3.2. Shelter City Volunteers Working Group

In order to broaden the local support for the project, Justice and Peace will set up a group of volunteers who have interest in human rights issues. It will be composed of students, representatives of local and human rights organisations and more generally any interested citizens willing to take part in the project, and will be led by Justice and Peace. On the one hand, the group will provide a social support network for the HRD in The Hague. On the other, it can provide additional ideas, contacts, resources, etc. that will help to better involve the HRD in the local life of the city and give visibility to the Shelter City Initiative.

The working group is not only beneficial for the HRD, who will be able to rely on a social network in the city, but also for the general public in The Hague. Citizens and students involved will gain nuanced knowledge and awareness on human rights issues through contacts and exchanges with hosted HRDs. Consequently, the number of people who are committed to working towards a safe and just world in the city of peace and justice of The Hague will grow. New synergies will also be created between different actors in the city.

The working group will meet at least 6 times a year to prepare the programme of the new guest and evaluate his/her stay. Besides, members of the group can meet separately with the HRDs.

3.3. Shelter City Platform and online communication

To support and improve the consistency and visibility of the Shelter City Initiative, Justice and Peace has built the online platform www.sheltercity.nl. It can be reached at different URL's: www.sheltercity.eu; www.sheltercity.org. The platform makes it possible to show local target audiences what is happening in the Shelter City and what it means. It is a platform for individual Shelter Cities, the human rights defenders, and human rights in general, and helps to involve the inhabitants in the Shelter City. Shelter City The Hague has its own page on the platform: <https://www.sheltercity.nl/city/den-haag/>.

Sheltercity.nl is a public-oriented and current platform with interesting news about the candidates and activities of the different Shelter Cities, with photos and blogs by various relevant writers. Blogs can be written by the candidate or by one of the partner organisations, but it is also possible to let for instance (famous) inhabitants, sponsors, and other partners speak. This way stories are told from different perspectives on human rights. Another possibility is to let people take action, by inviting them to register for an event, to contribute to or support Shelter City.

Justice and Peace manages the platform and is responsible for feeding the specific page for The Hague. Overall (all cities together), it is expected that about 1000 people per month will be informed about HRDs, HR and the Shelter City Initiative through visiting the Shelter City Platform or through the Justice and Peace website or Facebook page.

Local justice on a global scale

INTRODUCTION

Since September 2012, Justice and Peace has been implementing the Shelter City Initiative in The Hague, in partnership with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the municipality. The idea is to offer a shelter to human rights defenders (HRDs) whose lives are threatened and who face intense pressure in their country of origin due to their work. The Shelter City Initiative found its origins and justification in the need directly voiced by Justice and Peace's local partners to have a place where to find respite from their intense work and to escape when needed. The Initiative also met policy objectives at national,¹ European,² and international³ levels. Today, the need to support HRDs remains acute, as shown by the growing number of applications received during each call for the Shelter City Initiative.

The City of The Hague pioneered the idea, being the first Shelter City to welcome HRDs under the Initiative. Over the years, a growing number of cities joined, all of them convinced by the success and necessity of the project. Today, eight cities have become part of the project. Beyond the rise in number of HRDs hosted, Justice and Peace has worked to improve the quality of the programme for the participants, especially in The Hague, where HRDs are hosted in our office. HRDs have received increasingly professional support in terms of managing their security (training, analysis, plans), medical and psychological follow-up, networking, etc.

A crucial aspect of the Shelter City initiative is the connection it makes between the global and local levels, through the contribution of the municipality to the furtherance of international human rights and the individual linkage between HRDs from all over the world and Dutch cities. The Hague is in that sense ideally positioned. As the city of peace and justice and hub for international organisations, it offers a lot of opportunities for HRDs. On the other hand, the Shelter City Initiative offers ways to engage citizens on human rights issues. Human rights is a broad topic that can be approached from different angles, and Shelter City has the unique potential to create synergies between different actors in the city (such as schools, universities and research institutes, local initiatives, human rights organisations, or just interested citizens). The creation of a volunteer network and human rights education are some of the ways in which these actors can be brought together.

In the coming three years, Justice and Peace will continue to host and support HRDs, building up on the successes and experience it accumulated since 2012. Justice and Peace will particularly focus on further increasing its professionalism in the support it gives to human rights defenders, as well as providing more visibility and local support to the project within the city of The Hague. It will also introduce more flexibility by accepting HRDs on a rolling basis, and for more flexible periods of time (with a maximum kept at 90 days). The budget (see annex) has been drafted taking into account those elements, as well as the expenses effectively made in the past years.

PROJECT STRONG POINTS

- The project contributes to foster human rights worldwide by directly supporting those who work to improve these rights worldwide, at the expense of their own life.
- The project offers young people, together with the general public of The Hague, the possibility to receive first-hand information about the importance of human rights, democracy and the work of human rights defenders. Through debate and encounter with HRDs, they can develop informed opinion on those topics.
- The project makes human rights come alive, concrete and manageable. In consequence of this fact, the target groups behave and act as global citizens.

many human rights defenders across the globe. Translation is then provided during meetings and public events. The HRD has a work space at Justice and Peace's office. The costs for travel to and within the Netherlands, insurance, accommodation costs and a monthly stipend are provided.

In the coming years, Justice and Peace wants to learn from its experience and improve the programme by giving it more flexibility. The relatively strict timing with which we are able to host HRDs indeed excludes many of them from receiving help under the programme. More particularly, we are only open to applications a couple of weeks per year during the calls and we offer a standard 3-month stay. This means that we cannot answer the many requests we receive outside the call openings, nor accept HRDs who just need a short rest (a month for instance) outside of their country but cannot afford to be away from their field work or families for too long.

- answering demands we receive from partner organisations worldwide on a rolling basis instead of strictly within calls. Each application will continue to be submitted to the Selection Committee for review and approval, and reference checks will continue to be performed. Note that the fact that applications would be received through partners and not through an open call is an additional guarantee that candidates are adequate and have a backing from their organisations.
- enabling shorter, rest and respite stays for HRDs who urgently need time out of their countries but cannot afford to stay 3 months away from the field or families. This should also make the programme more gender-sensitive, as mothers are often put off by the idea of having to leave their children behind for such a long time.

1.2. Medical and psychological support, when needed, is provided to hosted HRDs

Medical and psychological support will continue to be offered to HRDs when needed, as this is an essential part of their rest time here. Check-up with a doctor is part of the intake. Experience has also underlined the importance of the psychological component, even for HRDs who are not directly traumatized. All of them have been through very harsh experiences and faced threats, sometimes even attacks, which can lead to trauma. Cooperation with specialized psychologists is therefore crucial. Psychological security and how to better deal with psychological side-effects of their work is also an aspect which is discussed during the training provided by Justice and Peace, and with the HRDs during their stay.

1.3. Support in case of emergency situation (HRD cannot leave)

Because of the work they do and the context they come from, it can happen that unexpected events directly affect the situation of an HRD during his/her stay in The Hague. In that case, Justice and Peace supports the HRD in making the security analysis and devising alternative plans for the future. The stay of the HRD can be extended for a maximal period of three months, during which basic support will continue to be provided (accommodation, livelihood and travel).

NB: For the budget lines corresponding to this activity, as well as for costs reserved for medical and psychological costs, the costs will not necessarily be made. In order to avoid being short on budget to cover those costs (which can be high if they must be made), Justice and Peace offers the possibility to

2.1. Networking and lobby

Broadening their network is very important for HRDs while in The Netherlands. It enables them to not only create new partnerships and attract attention on their work, but also to increase their own security by being embedded in an international network that can be called upon if they are in trouble after their return to their home country.

The Hague is a hub for international organisations and NGOs working in peace and justice, but also the seat of the national government and institutions. This makes it a good place for HRDs to extend their network. When necessary, Justice and Peace also introduces HRDs to relevant institutions outside The Hague, such as in Brussels. In this way, awareness about the human rights situation in the regions where the HRD works is increased through the sharing of information with Dutch and EU NGOs, politicians and decision-makers.

Broadening the network of the HRD is thus not only beneficial for him or her, but also for other actors such as Dutch politicians who receive first-hand information on the human rights situation in the country of origin of the HRD.

2.2. Training

The Shelter City Initiative aims at having a long-term impact for the participants, and through them, on the human rights situation they are trying to improve back home. Increasing their capacities is crucial in order to enable HRDs to perform their work in a better and safer way after they return to their countries.

Since the beginning of the project, HRDs have been able to follow **language courses, courses on human rights or any other course relevant to the work they do**. In the coming years, Justice and

provides HRDs with a strong set of skills to improve their security after return as well as lobby and advocacy skills. Networking and sharing experience with other HRDs is also essential, as it creates a peer network of HRDs all over the world, in which to draw inspiration and support. Enabling the Shelter City participants to take part in the THTC will strengthen the long-term impact of the project by providing HRDs with the necessary tools to work in a safer and more efficient way.

3. LOCAL OUTREACH AND CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT

Objective 3: Citizens and students in The Hague gain nuanced knowledge and awareness on human rights issues through contacts and exchanges with hosted HRDs

Expected results

- Minimum 300 MBO and HBO students, 200 university students and 400 members of the public per year will be taught about human rights and meet and debate with a HRD.
- A volunteers working group is established and meets at least 6 times a year to organise activities and events with the hosted HRDs.
- 1000 people per month will visit the Shelter City Platform, Justice and Peace website or Facebook page and be informed about HRDs, human rights and the Shelter City Initiative.

Activities

- Develop information and education material.
- Prepare and facilitate events/lectures for The Hague students and citizens.
- Set up and coordinate the volunteers working group.
- Maintain and update the online platform and website.

One of the objectives of Justice and Peace through the Shelter City Initiative is to increase citizens' and students' awareness of human rights. The implementation of the Shelter City Initiative in the city provides good avenues to bring the international concept of human rights in a local, municipal context and link this theoretic ideal to a specific person: the threatened human rights defender. In the coming three years, Justice and Peace will use three main tools to reach this objective: a human rights education programme, the Shelter City Volunteers Working Group, and the Shelter City online platform.

3.1. Human rights education

In a globalized world it is often assumed that everyone is aware of the problems that take place thousands of kilometres from here. However, this is often only true for a small part of the society. The majority of the population has no basic knowledge about human rights issues. Yet, those issues are frequently the subject of public and political debates and what happens elsewhere has, more than ever, an impact on their daily lives of people here (the refugee crisis is a good example). Students and the general public can greatly benefit from engaging in discussions and conversations on the topic. Besides providing the target groups with a general understanding of human rights (violations), meeting directly with human rights defenders will make the global, broad and complex problem of human rights violations more local, concrete and manageable. It is also an invitation to reflect upon how human rights are applied in The Netherlands.

With the educational program, Justice and Peace focuses on four target groups:

- MBO students
- HBO students
- University students
- The general public in The Hague

With three human rights defenders hosted in The Hague every year, Justice and Peace aims to reach the following numbers on an annual basis:

- Minimum 300 MBO and HBO students from the Hague area (minimum 5 lessons per year)
- Minimum 200 university students (minimum 3 lectures per year)
- Minimum 400 members of the public (minimum 4 public events per year)

In addition, it is likely that human rights defenders will be the subject of one or more articles in local national newspapers or radios, as it has been in the past. The media coverage will make a wide audience aware of the challenging and difficult circumstances under which human rights defenders have to do their work, will generate more attention for the Shelter City Initiative in The Hague and will also underline the role of The Hague as city of peace and justice.

3.2. Shelter City Volunteers Working Group

In order to broaden the local support for the project, Justice and Peace will set up a group of volunteers who have interest in human rights issues. It will be composed of students, representatives of local and human rights organisations and more generally any interested citizens willing to take part in the project, and will be led by Justice and Peace. On the one hand, the group will provide a social support network for the HRD in The Hague. On the other, it can provide additional ideas, contacts, resources, etc. that will help to better involve the HRD in the local life of the city and give visibility to the Shelter City Initiative.

The working group is not only beneficial for the HRD, who will be able to rely on a social network in the city, but also for the general public in The Hague. Citizens and students involved will gain nuanced knowledge and awareness on human rights issues through contacts and exchanges with hosted HRDs. Consequently, the number of people who are committed to working towards a safe and just world in the city of peace and justice of The Hague will grow. New synergies will also be created between different actors in the city.

The working group will meet at least 6 times a year to prepare the programme of the new guest and evaluate his/her stay. Besides, members of the group can meet separately with the HRDs.

3.3. Shelter City Platform and online communication

To support and improve the consistency and visibility of the Shelter City Initiative, Justice and Peace has built the online platform www.sheltercity.nl. It can be reached at different URL's: www.sheltercity.eu; www.sheltercity.org. The platform makes it possible to show local target audiences what is happening in the Shelter City and what it means. It is a platform for individual Shelter Cities, the human rights defenders, and human rights in general, and helps to involve the inhabitants in the Shelter City. Shelter City The Hague has its own page on the platform: <https://www.sheltercity.nl/city/den-haag/>.

Sheltercity.nl is a public-oriented and current platform with interesting news about the candidates and activities of the different Shelter Cities, with photos and blogs by various relevant writers. Blogs can be written by the candidate or by one of the partner organisations, but it is also possible to let for instance (famous) inhabitants, sponsors, and other partners speak. This way stories are told from different perspectives on human rights. Another possibility is to let people take action, by inviting them to register for an event, to contribute to or support Shelter City.

Justice and Peace manages the platform and is responsible for feeding the specific page for The Hague. Overall (all cities together), it is expected that about 1000 people per month will be informed about HRDs, HR and the Shelter City Initiative through visiting the Shelter City Platform or through the Justice and Peace website or Facebook page.

Inleiding

De organisatie ziet in 2017 wederom een grote inzet van stagiaires en vrijwilligers. Ondanks de uitdagingen voor Justice and Peace, maar vooral dankzij het commitment van de staf, en een eenmalige meevaller heeft de organisatie het negatief saldo kunnen beperken tot een bedrag van 511.c EUR. Nog altijd groeit het aantal organisaties dat ons benadert en met ons wil samenwerken of gebruik wil maken van onze expertise op het gebied van trainingen.

Het financieel jaarverslag 2017 is een verslag dat duidelijk laat zien dat de ruimte en (financiële) steun voor vooral middelgrote mensenrechtenorganisaties nog altijd kleiner wordt. Dit heeft in eerste instantie te maken met het kleiner wordend totale budget voor de sector (en specifiek activiteiten op het terrein van mensenrechten en sociale gerechtigheid) en de groeiende concurrentie. De verdere eisen die gesteld worden aan organisaties beperken kleinere organisaties in waar zij hun fondsen kunnen aanvragen. De voorwaarden zijn steeds vaker onmogelijk te vervullen door limieten in budget, menskracht die nodig is om een aanvraag in te dienen of andere voorwaarden aan de organisatie, bijv. het bereik van een organisatie en wereldwijde achterban.

Ondanks deze uitdagingen bouwt Justice and Peace aan een solide organisatie die meer naamsbekendheid krijgt en op andere manieren aan fondsenwerving gaat doen, zoals crowdfunding. Om zekerheid op het terrein van fondsenwerving te behalen voor ons gehele programma achten we investeringen in communicatie noodzakelijk en daarom hebben we ook in 2017 veel geïnvesteerd in ontwikkel- en communicatiekosten.

CONTROLEVERKLARING VAN DE ONAFHANKELIJK ACCOUNTANT

A. Verklaring over de in het jaarverslag opgenomen jaarrekening 2017

Ons oordeel

Wij hebben de jaarrekening 2017 van Stichting Justice and Peace Netherlands te 's Gravenhage gecontroleerd.

Naar ons oordeel geeft de in dit jaarverslag opgenomen jaarrekening een getrouw beeld van de grootte en de samenstelling van het vermogen van Stichting Justice and Peace Netherlands per 31 december 2017 en van het resultaat over 2017.

De jaarrekening bestaat uit:

1. de balans per 31 december 2017;
2. de winst- en verliesrekening over 2017; en
3. de toelichting met een overzicht van de gehanteerde grondslagen voor financiële verslaggeving en andere toelichtingen

De basis voor ons oordeel

Wij hebben onze controle uitgevoerd volgens het Nederlands recht, waaronder ook de Nederlandse controlestandaarden vallen. Onze verantwoordelijkheden op grond hiervan zijn beschreven in de sectie 'Onze verantwoordelijkheden voor de controle van de jaarrekening'. Wij zijn onafhankelijk van Stichting Justice and Peace Netherlands zoals vereist in de Verordening inzake de onafhankelijkheid van accountants bij assurance-opdrachten (ViO) en andere voor de opdracht relevante onafhankelijkheidsregels in Nederland. Verder hebben wij voldaan aan de Verordening gedrags- en beroepsregels accountants (VGBA).

Wij vinden dat de door ons verkregen controle-informatie voldoende en geschikt is als basis voor ons oordeel.

B. Beschrijving van verantwoordelijkheden met betrekking tot de jaarrekening

Verantwoordelijkheden van het bestuur voor de jaarrekening

Het bestuur is verantwoordelijk voor het opmaken en getrouw weergeven van de jaarrekening. In dit kader is het bestuur verantwoordelijk voor een zodanige interne beheersing die het bestuur noodzakelijk acht om het opmaken van de jaarrekening mogelijk te maken zonder afwijkingen van materieel belang als gevolg van fouten of fraude.

Bij het opmaken van de jaarrekening moet het bestuur afwegen of de onderneming in staat is om haar werkzaamheden in continuïteit voort te zetten. Op grond van genoemd verslaggevingsstelsel moet het bestuur de jaarrekening opmaken op basis van de continuïteitsveronderstelling, tenzij het bestuur het voornehmen heeft om de vennootschap te

liquideren of de bedrijfsactiviteiten te beëindigen of als beëindiging het enige realistische alternatief is.

Het bestuur moet gebeurtenissen en omstandigheden waardoor gerede twijfel zou kunnen bestaan of de onderneming haar bedrijfsactiviteiten in continuïteit kan voortzetten, toelichten in de jaarrekening

De met governance belaste personen zijn verantwoordelijk voor het uitoefenen van toezicht op het proces van financiële verslaggeving van de stichting.

Onze verantwoordelijkheden voor de controle van de jaarrekening

Onze verantwoordelijkheid is het zodanig plannen en uitvoeren van een controleopdracht dat wij daarmee voldoende en geschikte controle-informatie verkrijgen voor het door ons af te geven oordeel.

Onze controle is uitgevoerd met een hoge mate maar geen absolute mate van zekerheid waardoor het mogelijk is dat wij tijdens onze controle niet alle materiële fouten en fraude ontdekken.

Afwijkingen kunnen ontstaan als gevolg van fraude of fouten en zijn materieel indien redelijkerwijs kan worden verwacht dat deze, afzonderlijk of gezamenlijk, van invloed kunnen zijn op de economische beslissingen die gebruikers op basis van deze jaarrekening nemen. De materialiteit beïnvloedt de aard, timing en omvang van onze controlewerkzaamheden en de evaluatie van het effect van onderkende afwijkingen op ons oordeel.

Wij hebben deze accountantscontrole professioneel kritisch uitgevoerd en hebben waar relevant professionele oordeelsvorming toegepast in overeenstemming met de Nederlandse controlesstandaarden, ethische voorschriften en de onafhankelijkheidseisen. Onze controle bestond onder andere uit:

- het identificeren en inschatten van de risico's dat de jaarrekening afwijkingen van materieel belang bevat als gevolg van fouten of fraude, het in reactie op deze risico's bepalen en uitvoeren van controlewerkzaamheden en het verkrijgen van controle-informatie die voldoende en geschikt is als basis voor ons oordeel. Bij fraude is het risico dat een afwijking van materieel belang niet ontdekt wordt groter dan bij fouten. Bij fraude kan sprake zijn van samenspanning, valsheid in geschrifte, het opzettelijk nalaten transacties vast te leggen, het opzettelijk verkeerd voorstellen van zaken of het doorbreken van de interne beheersing;
- het verkrijgen van inzicht in de interne beheersing die relevant is voor de controle met als doel controlewerkzaamheden te selecteren die passend zijn in de omstandigheden. Deze werkzaamheden hebben niet als doel om een oordeel uit te spreken over de effectiviteit van de interne beheersing van de entiteit;
- het evalueren van de geschiktheid van de gebruikte grondslagen voor financiële verslaggeving en het evalueren van de redelijkheid van schattingen door het bestuur en de toelichtingen die daarover in de jaarrekening staan;
- het vaststellen dat de door het bestuur gehanteerde continuïteitsveronderstelling aanvaardbaar is. Tevens het op basis van de verkregen controle-informatie vaststellen of er gebeurtenissen en omstandigheden zijn waardoor gerede twijfel zou kunnen bestaan of de onderneming haar bedrijfsactiviteiten in continuïteit kan voortzetten. Als wij concluderen dat er een onzekerheid van materieel belang bestaat, zijn wij verplicht om aandacht in onze controleverklaring te vestigen op de relevante gerelateerde toelichtingen in de jaarrekening. Als de toelichtingen inadequaat zijn, moeten wij onze verklaring aanpassen. Onze conclusies



zijn gebaseerd op de controle-informatie die verkregen is tot de datum van onze controleverklaring. Toekomstige gebeurtenissen of omstandigheden kunnen er echter toe leiden dat een onderneming haar continuïteit niet langer kan handhaven;

- het evalueren van de presentatie, structuur en inhoud van de jaarrekening en de daarin opgenomen toelichtingen; en
- het evalueren of de jaarrekening een getrouw beeld geeft van de onderliggende transacties en gebeurtenissen.

Wij communiceren met de met governance belaste personen onder andere over de geplande reikwijdte en timing van de controle en over de significante bevindingen die uit onze controle naar voren zijn gekomen, waaronder eventuele significante tekortkomingen in de interne beheersing.



French and Spanish-speaking HRDs. This is a great asset for Shelter City The Hague, as language is a barrier for many human rights defenders across the globe. Translation is then provided during meetings and public events. The HRD has a work space at Justice and Peace's office. The costs for travel to and within the Netherlands, insurance, accommodation costs and a monthly stipend are provided.

1.2. Medical and psychological support, when needed, is provided to hosted HRDs

Medical and psychological support will continue to be offered to HRDs when needed, as this is an essential part of their rest time here. Check-up with a doctor is part of the intake. Experience has also underlined the importance of the psychological component, even for HRDs who are not directly traumatized. All of them have been through very harsh experiences and faced threats, sometimes even attacks, which can lead to trauma. Cooperation with specialized psychologists is therefore crucial.

1.3. Support in case of emergency situation (HRD cannot leave)

Because of the work they do and the context they come from, it can happen that unexpected events directly affect the situation of an HRD during his/her stay in The Hague. In that case, Justice and Peace supports the HRD in making the security analysis and devising alternative plans for the future. The stay of the HRD can be extended for a maximum period of three months, during which basic support will continue to be provided (accommodation, livelihood and travel).

Objective 2: Provide sheltered human rights defenders with appropriate resources to continue their work after return

Expected results

- Hosted HRDs extend their professional network in The Netherlands and Europe and thereby attract attention for the situation in their country, strengthen their international profile and thereby their security.

2.1. Networking and lobby

Broadening their network is very important for HRDs while in The Netherlands. It enables them to not only create new partnerships and attract attention on their work, but also to increase their own security by being embedded in an international network that can be called upon if they are in trouble after their return to their home country.

The Hague is a hub for international organisations and NGOs working in peace and justice, but also the seat of the national government and institutions. This makes it a good place for HRDs to extend their network. When necessary, Justice and Peace also introduces HRDs to relevant institutions outside The Hague, such as in Brussels. In this way, awareness about the human rights situation in the regions where the HRD works is increased through the sharing of information with Dutch and EU NGOs, politicians and decision-makers.

Broadening the network of the HRD is thus not only beneficial for him or her, but also for other actors such as Dutch politicians who receive first-hand information on the human rights situation in the country of origin of the HRD. As part of the Shelter City programme, Justice and Peace organizes a half-day visit to the ICC for all participants.

2.2. Courses and training

The Shelter City Initiative aims at having a long-term impact for the participants, and through them, on the human rights situation they are trying to improve back home. Increasing their capacities is crucial in order to enable HRDs to perform their work in a better and safer way after they return to their countries.

Since the beginning of the project, HRDs have been able to follow language courses, courses on human rights or any other course relevant to the work they do. In the coming years, Justice and Peace will

2.3 Security training

Justice and Peace will continue to provide security trainings covering physical, digital and psychological aspects of security to the HRDs hosted. In addition, Justice and Peace organizes an advocacy training. It provides HRDs with a strong set of skills to improve their security after return as well as lobby and advocacy skills. Networking and sharing experience with other HRDs is also essential, as it creates a peer network of HRDs all over the world, in which to draw inspiration and support. Enabling the Shelter City participants to take part in the security training strengthens the long-term impact of the project by providing HRDs with the necessary tools to work in a safer and more efficient way. HRDs will also receive personal security accompaniment during their stay in The Hague and draft a security plan for return.

Objective 3: Citizens and students in The Hague gain nuanced knowledge and awareness on human rights issues through contacts and exchanges with hosted HRDs

Expected results

- *Information and educational material will be developed*
- *Minimum 300 MBO and HBO students, 200 university students and 400 members of the public per year will be taught about human rights and meet and debate with a HRD.*
- *A volunteers working group is established and meets at least 6 times a year to organise activities and events with the hosted HRDs.*

3.1. Information and education material

To support and improve the consistency and visibility of the Shelter City Initiative, Justice and Peace has built the online platform www.sheltercity.nl. It can be reached at different URL's: www.sheltercity.eu; www.sheltercity.org. The platform makes it possible to show local target audiences what is happening in the Shelter City and what it means. It is a platform for individual Shelter Cities, the human rights defenders, and human rights in general, and helps to involve the inhabitants in the Shelter City. Shelter City The Hague has its own page on the platform: <https://www.sheltercity.nl/city/den-haag/>. 1000 people per month will visit the Shelter City Platform, Justice and Peace website or Facebook page and be informed about HRDs, human rights and the Shelter City Initiative through the online platform or developed information and education material. Also, Justice and Peace will develop educational materials to support the educational outreach programme.

3.2. Human rights education

One of the objectives of Justice and Peace through the Shelter City Initiative is to increase citizens' and students' awareness of human rights. The implementation of the Shelter City Initiative in the city provides good avenues to bring the international concept of human rights in a local, municipal context and link this theoretic ideal to a specific person: the threatened human rights defender.

With the educational program, Justice and Peace focuses on four target groups:

- MBO students
- HBO students
- University students
- The general public in The Hague

reach the following numbers on an annual basis:

- Minimum 300 MBO and HBO students from the Hague area (minimum 5 lessons per year)
- Minimum 200 university students (minimum 3 lectures per year)
- Minimum 400 members of the public (minimum 4 public events per year)

In addition, human rights defenders are often the subject of one or more articles in local or national media. The media coverage makes a wide audience aware of the challenging and difficult circumstances under which human rights defenders have to do their work, will generate more attention for the Shelter City Initiative in The Hague and will also underline the role of The Hague as city of peace and justice.

3.3. Shelter City Volunteers Working Group

In order to broaden the local support for the project, Justice and Peace continuous to work with a group of volunteers, who form a social support network for the human rights defenders or help them with translations.

The working group is not only beneficial for the HRD, who are able to rely on a social network in the city, but also for the general public in The Hague. Citizens and students involved will gain nuanced knowledge and awareness on human rights issues through contacts and exchanges with hosted HRDs.

Justice and Peace positively looks back at the stay of the HRDs in the Hague. The HRDs were able to reach their objectives that were set up before and shortly after arrival together with Justice and Peace. All HRDs were able to extend their international network by meeting with relevant contacts at the

All HRDs were

able to follow holistic security training, make new social contacts, and if needed language courses. During their stay the HRDs who requested this received psychological support. Moreover, they were able to engage in activities that were focused on their wellbeing such as yoga and Tai Chi classes. All HRDs have returned to their home countries. Justice and Peace remains in contact with the HRDs. All the HRDs have reported that they have continued their human rights work with new energy, new contacts and new skills in their field of work.

While the temporary relocation of the HRDs is the main goal, the programme also tries to create awareness on the necessity of human rights and knowledge on human rights violations with the citizens of the Shelter Cities. In light of this, Justice and Peace Netherlands organised meetings at Het Nutshuis as well as universities and schools. Both the HRDs and the audience responded very positively to the meetings and indicated that they were inspired by the stories of the HRDs.

1. INTRODUCTION

All HRDs gained relevant contacts within local and international NGO's, ministries and at the local, national and European political level. They were also able to follow courses, psychological support and get valuable rest and respite. Holistic security training sessions allowed participants to meet, exchange on protection strategies, and get to know protection strategies from HRDs from other countries. The security training sessions focused on digital, physical and organizational security, wellbeing, and advocacy. In preparation of their return, the HRDs received personal guidance to review their security plan as well as a small financial support that enabled them to reintegrate into their situation back home and resume work after return. Some most at risk cases received specific guidance and follow-up to track their return, in collaboration with external partners such as the Dutch embassy. They all returned to their home countries and resumed their work with new energy, new contacts and more knowledge in their field of work.

A key part of Shelter City is the connection with local people in The Hague with HRDs from around the world. By doing this, we not only create a larger solidarity network for HRDs, but also encourage a two-way knowledge exchange, as it creates awareness about human rights worldwide. In this respect, JP organised lectures, workshops, and interactive events for the wide public, as well as meetings with students at universities and high schools. A more structural education format (Shelter City School) is currently being developed to increase the amount of students that we can reach in The Hague and across the Netherlands.

1. Introduction

It has been a reasonably successful year as we have been able to develop our two programs human rights defenders and security and migration and human rights further on what we have set up since 2015. Justice and Peace is becoming more known as an expert in the field of security and human rights and as an organisation providing safe spaces for human rights defenders. We are gradually building a network of partners in both programmes. Our method of working on the local level with cities, local NGOs and civil initiatives is taking off and showing that we took the right direction. Justice and Peace is more and more known in a large network of human rights defenders and professionals as a human rights organisation that implements its vision by working with a diversity of partners on the city level. This way we contribute to the implementation of human rights on the local level – a challenge for human rights in the past decades.

within the framework of the Shelter City programme. More focus will be put on the training and empowerment elements within the 3 months relocation period of HRDs. In 2017 we started to focus on connecting the trainings with the temporary relocation programme and we worked with a smaller group of HRDs for a longer period of time helping them to become more resilient and continue to their work for a longer period of time.

Our migration and human rights program has taken a flight and has been mainly about developing a concrete vision on forced migration and how to deal with this phenomenon. On the basis of a publication 'building bridges instead of higher walls' we have continued on building bridges within the Netherlands between NGO's, local authorities, churches, civil initiatives and refugees, giving a face to local solidarity and bringing initiatives together. This is still continuing in our Welkom Hier campaign. We organised ^{5.1.2.h} and brought together more than 150 organisations together and a few thousand visitors in total. We are working on a publication on local solidarity initiatives in the Netherlands, the potential of and support for local solidarity and what ideas live on local solidarity. How these ideas can be put into practice are now being worked out in two pilot projects called the 'Together Project' (focussing on integration and local solidarity) and Haagse Huiskamer.

2017 has also been a year in which we have been focussing on lobby, especially on the space for HRD's and legal ways for Safe passage of refugees to Europe. We are also further developing new strategies for our communication continuing to expand our visibility as an organisation. Justice and Peace is becoming an organization that is more known for its innovative work, for example the Shelter City Initiative and its spin offs like the research fellowship program for human rights defenders, the Haagse Huiskamer and the Together Project. We continue to be true to the goals of our organization that were formulated 50 years ago.

New brand, online channels, and videos

In 2017, Justice and Peace started a new brand, new online channels and the use of videos. In the second half of 2017, a logo and website have been developed for the new Haagse Huiskamer platform. To reach out to more partners and supporters and to better profile and promote our projects we launched a LinkedIn page for Haagse Huiskamer and a Shelter City Facebook page. We started the development of a new corporate website, that will be launched in 2018. We also started making attractive videos, by Justice and Peace staff and by (volunteering) professional film makers, which have been very well received over our social media outreach.

Decentralisation and extra capacity

In the past year, Justice and Peace saw an increase of communication activities. This became possible as Communications became a primary part of the working processes of Justice and Peace. Organising events and participating in outreach has become part of the teams' goals and work. At least two to four extra Communications interns were working at a period, some of them hired and integrated into the teams.

The Communications Advisor and interns started participating in the two weekly team meetings of the Human Rights Defenders team and the Migration team. To manage Communications, the Communications Advisor started a monthly Communication Team meeting with the office manager and the interns involved in Communications. Two volunteers also joined the team to create videos and write interviews and press releases.

Outreach

In the past year, the Justice and Peace outreach has grown exponentially. This can be attributed to the high amount of events organised and hosted, attractive digital content including new videos, the launch of Haagse Huiskamer and publications, increased press visibility and the recruitment of Communications interns.

The first half of 2017, particularly in the months of May, June and July for the corporate channels, saw an increased growth in social media outreach as a result of increased capacity and through the creation of new, activating and attractive digital content. The second half of 2017 also saw a large increase in outreach of online communications through the Justice and Peace Facebook page. Two exhibitions, the Shelter City Maastricht exhibition and Shrinking Space exhibition, saw a heightened increase in outreach in the months of November and December. December also saw a high outreach on the international level, particularly as a result of the Human Rights Tulip award. For Welkom Hier, outreach is highest in the running up to a Welkom Hier festival.

INTRODUCTION

The idea behind Shelter City is thus as relevant today as it has been in 2012 when the project's pilot was first launched. It was also clear from the beginning of the programme that the respite period ought to be used to strengthen the HRDs' capabilities, with a view to improve their work for human rights in their home country. We believe that HRDs are change makers and contribute to defending universal rights that are the essence of a fairer world, and we thus want to continue supporting them and at the same time increase more awareness for their human rights work.

Beyond the rise in number of HRDs hosted, Justice and Peace has worked to improve the quality of the programme for the participants. HRDs have received increasingly professional support in terms of managing their security (training on digital and physical security), wellbeing, medical check-ups and advocacy trainings.

A crucial aspect of the Shelter City initiative is the connection it makes between the global and local levels, through the contribution of the municipality to the furtherance of international human rights and the individual linkage between HRDs from all over the world and Dutch cities. The Hague is in that sense ideally positioned. As the city of peace and justice and hub for international organisations, it

offers a lot of opportunities for HRDs. The Shelter City Initiative offers ways to engage citizens on human rights issues. Human rights is a broad topic that can be approached from different angles, and Shelter City has the unique potential to create synergies between different actors in the city (such as schools, universities and research institutes, local initiatives, human rights organisations, or just interested citizens). The creation of a volunteer network and human rights education are some of the ways in which these actors can be brought together. Today, there is an active volunteer network available for the Shelter City guests, consisting of a broad variety of citizens of The Hague.

In the coming three years, Justice and Peace will continue to host and support HRDs, building up on the successes and experience it accumulated since 2012. We see an increase in the amount of applications from HRDs, and the demand exceeds our capacity. To respond to this increasing demand, we would like to ^{5.1.2.b} as we see that The Hague provides suitable infrastructure to accommodate HRDs. Additionally, we would like to enhance the gender component of our programme by starting a pilot project with family relocation, allowing women human rights defenders with dependants to take part in the programme.

In the coming three years, we will further develop our visibility and educational activities in the Hague, continuously organize events with our Shelter City guests, expand and consolidate the volunteer network, and introduce the concept of Shelter City Schools.

The budget (see annex I) has been drafted taking into account those elements, as well as the expenses effectively made in the past years.

PROJECT STRONG POINTS

- Shelter City empowers human rights defenders to continue their important work back home and contributes to foster human rights worldwide by directly supporting those who work to improve these rights worldwide;
- Shelter City is an effective means to create connections, support and new collaborations between local organisations in The Hague. The project creates new synergies and cooperation between different actors in the city who are not usually working together;
- In the Hague a network of volunteers is created around the human rights defender. This creates a strong and active support network of individuals who are in direct contact with the human rights defender. Youngsters and students often form part of this group of volunteers. Apart from creating international solidarity and awareness of human rights issues, this often results in a life-long local support network and friendship for the human rights defender;
- Through public events, lectures at schools and universities, workshops and encounters, human rights defenders contribute to raising awareness about human rights among the citizens of the Hague and across the Netherlands. They get first-hand information, testimonies and knowledge on human rights in different countries around the world through direct interactions with the human rights defender. In that way, the Shelter City Initiative contributes to the building of an open and critical society, while encouraging international solidarity;
- The international Shelter City network offers municipalities the opportunity to exchange expertise with Dutch and international cities on human rights issues and successful local (Shelter City) initiatives. Shelter City is a very concrete tool to stimulate collaboration and contacts between cities;

- The project has received and will continue to receive media coverage and public attention, highlighting the role of The Hague as city of peace and justice and giving it a specific identity as a city for human rights (see annex II for examples of outreach and media coverage).

OUR OBJECTIVES FOR 2020-2022

The **overall objective** of the Shelter City Initiative is to continue protecting and supporting human rights defenders worldwide, so that they can continue their human rights work as effectively as possible, reclaim civic spaces and continue promoting and improving the human rights situation globally. With these in mind, the specific objectives of our project for the upcoming years in The Hague are to:

1. SHELTER HUMAN RIGHTS DEFENDERS

Objective 1: Support and protect	<small>5.1.2.h</small>	offering them temporary relocation to The Hague.
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Justice and Peace continues its efforts to carefully screen candidates before their final selection to the programme. Amongst the 500-600 applications we receive annually, Justice and Peace would like to increase the amount of HRDs hosted in The Hague 5.1.2.h. Thanks to its multilingual staff, Justice and Peace is able to host English, French and Spanish-speaking HRDs. This is a great asset for Shelter City The Hague, as language is a barrier for many human rights defenders across the globe. As in the previous years, Justice and Peace wants to continue providing the option to HRDs to stay shorter than three months, in case they cannot afford to be away from their field work or families for too long.

During their 3 month stay, each guest receives an apartment, a stipend and benefits from a personal accompaniment by a local mentor. The HRD has a work space at Justice and Peace's office. We offer them personalised support like psychosocial support to overcome traumas, burnout, and sometimes depression due to their highly intensive and risky work. Some receive university classes and medical check-ups. After 3 months, they have had the opportunity to let loose of tensions, build more capacity and strengthen their support network. They can go back home better equipped to consolidate their security as human rights advocates and change makers.

The Hague is a hub for international organisations and NGOs working in peace and justice, but also the seat of the national government and institutions. This makes it a good place for HRDs to extend their network. When necessary, Justice and Peace also introduces HRDs to relevant institutions outside 5.1.2.h. In this way, awareness about the human rights situation in the regions where the HRD works is increased through the sharing of information with Dutch and EU NGOs, politicians and decision-makers.

2. RESILIENCE HUMAN RIGHTS DEFENDERS

Objective 2: Build the security and long term resilience 5.1.2.h and their organisations through an integrated and flexible training programme in order to continue their human rights work in a safer and enabling manner.

With a view to provide a crosscutting and holistic approach of protection, Justice and Peace combines both relocation and resilience for HRDs. While temporary shelters are necessary and life-changing for the guests, preparing them to face the challenges waiting for them back home is equally important. To meet those challenges, Justice and Peace wants to strengthen the resilience of HRDs at risk - who will be temporarily relocated in The Hague - through our training programme. In the coming years, the training will continue to be an integral part of the Shelter City initiative, while finding innovative ways to disseminate the knowledge.

During their stay in the Netherlands, HRDs will receive a holistic and tailor-made training programme. It will entail a wide range of security and protection related topics such as security management, digital security, advocacy, wellbeing and body work. With an in-house team of trainers, complemented with external experts, the training will not only address issues of individual and organisational security, preparedness to return after temporary relocation, risk prevention and mitigation strategies, but also wellbeing strategies to build resilience. Group sessions on wellbeing will be combined with individual optional sessions, to adapt to each HRD's needs.

Justice and Peace will further contribute to the long term resilience of former participants with the frequent update and dissemination of the online 'Resources for HRDs' page, a bimonthly security newsletter to former Shelter City participants, and the creation of new training video tutorials on digital security and wellbeing.

3. FAMILY RELOCATION

Objective 3: Support and promote the safety of specific vulnerable groups of human rights defenders by further enhancing also the gender perspective of the temporary relocation programme.

In the past years we have also identified HRDs at risk who cannot or will not join the programme due to the fact that they have a family to take care of. Therefore, we wish to work towards a setup in which we can host defenders with their dependents in line with the Resolution of the European Parliament on EU policies in favor of HRDs. This enhances the gender perspective of the Shelter City Initiative, specifically by helping women and youth (under 18) human rights defenders to take part in our programme, women who are now - despite all difficulties and challenges in their home countries continuing their work - without having a possibility to take a break, because they cannot or do not want to leave their children behind. This implies that Justice and Peace together with the city of The Hague (as the first city to offer this family relocation) would have to provide proper housing and other necessities for families. It also requires for the granting of visa for temporary relocation of HRDs with their dependents.

4. PUBLIC EDUCATION, OUTREACH AND CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT

Objective 4: Expand the public support for human rights defenders in the Hague and across the Netherlands by enhancing the social impact of the Shelter City Initiative.

Reclaiming the civic space cannot be achieved through a single actor alone, which is why the strengthening of the public support for HRDs as well as the education and mobilisation of citizens for the promotion of human rights are principal parts of this project. We believe that everyone is a potential change maker, and by connecting HRDs to citizens in the Hague we enhance awareness for human rights.

Justice and Peace will actively aim to make a new generation of young people more human rights conscious through the concept of 'Shelter City School'. Schools will be able to sign up as a Shelter City School. Consequently, they will receive a programme consisting of a number of three classes. By providing partner schools with educational material, new knowledge on social media tools and digital security for positive change, and a guest lecture from a human rights defender, Justice and Peace will make human rights more concrete. Moreover, emphasis will be placed on the way how students can conduct human rights action at the local level to support the work of HRDs.

In order to inspire change and connect the general public to the work of HRDs and Justice and Peace, a series of events will be organized throughout the year in The Hague. Justice and Peace will organize at least 4 events per year in the form of documentary screenings, panel discussions or interactive experiences.

The volunteer network will be further expanded and consolidated, as we see that the social contact with local citizens provides a valuable contribution to the HRDs stay. And vice versa, for the local citizens of the Hague interaction with an HRD is an inspiring experience.




Introduction

The overall objective of the Shelter City Initiative is to enable human rights defenders (HRDs) worldwide to protect and promote human rights in a safer and more effective manner, thereby contributing to a safer and more enabling environment for all human rights work. The initiative will be carried out in a similar way as in previous years, offering temporary relocation, rest and respite and capacity building to HRDs for a period of maximum 3 months. Our goal is that the HRDs will return and continue their work in their own country, with new energy, skills and contacts. Security and wellbeing will remain the main focus of our training offer, combined with personalised accompaniment. A gender focus will be further embedded in the programme, by starting a pilot project with family relocation. In the coming year, we will emphasize follow up support after return, enabling Shelter City alumni to support their human rights organisation and their broader network using their newly acquired skills, knowledge and network(s). We aim for alumni to continue feeling part of a broader international community of HRDs, supported by partner organisations.

To meet the growing demand for temporary relocation, Justice and Peace continuously works on expanding the network of Shelter Cities to other European cities, and other regions where the HRDs work. In 2021 this will remain a priority for Justice and Peace. At the same time, we aim to strengthen the collaboration between the current international hubs, by further developing structures for collaboration and by organizing the annual International Shelter City Workshop. We stimulate participating cities to work in alliance with each other to exchange lessons learned, to organize joint public events and to strengthen support to HRDs. Justice and Peace will continue to lobby for national, regional and local policy makers to support the creation of more temporary safe spaces in the Netherlands and abroad.

As in previous years, an important element of Shelter City is to raise awareness about HRDs and their work and to mobilize people to actively support HRDs, contributing to a critical mass that demands policy makers to take action to support HRDs and the space to operate. As in previous years, our main focus will be on youth in the Netherlands, the future generation of changemakers. In 2021 we will launch the pilot phase of Shelter City School, integrating human rights and the work of HRDs in the school curriculum, in addition to organizing events and online communications. In our


communications outings, we will continue to raise awareness for the stories of HRDs and the threats to their work.

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Objectives

Objective 1: 5.1.2.h

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To a large extent the programme will be carried out in a similar way as in previous years, offering rest and respite and capacity building to HRDs for a period of maximum 3 months, while taking into account all COVID-19 measures. Our goal is for the HRDs to return and continue their work in their own country, with new energy, skills, knowledge and contacts.

Due to COVID-19 we anticipate that we may not be able to reach the intended number of HRDs. Due to the new challenges that COVID-19 poses to our work, JP anticipates to spend additional time and costs on logistics and preparation of their stay, adjustments during their stay, support to the HRDs, and possible postponement of return due to COVID-19.

Objective 2: Build the security and long term resilience of 5.1.2.h and their organisations through an integrated and flexible training programme in order to continue their human rights work in a safer and enabling manner.

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Justice and Peace will further contribute to the long-term resilience of former participants with the frequent update and dissemination of the bi-weekly 'Resilience Update' shared on our social media channels and in the alumni Facebook group. The HRD Resources page on the new Shelter City website will also be regularly updated and shared. In addition, we will assess production of a new set of video tutorials on digital security, wellbeing and other topics to meet alumni and other HRDs' needs.

Objective 3: Support and promote the safety of specific vulnerable groups of human rights defenders by further enhancing also the gender perspective of the temporary relocation programme.

Over the past years we have identified at risk women human rights defenders who cannot or will not join the programme due to the reality that they have a family to take care of. Therefore, we wish to work towards a setup in which we can host defenders with their dependents in line with the Resolution of the European Parliament on EU policies in favour of HRDs.¹ This enhances the gender perspective of the Shelter City Initiative, specifically by helping more women human rights defenders to benefit from our programme. This implies that Justice and Peace and the city of The Hague (where this pilot for family relocation will take place) would provide proper housing and other necessities for families. It also requires for the granting of visa for relocation of HRDs with their dependents, for which JP has advocated in the past year and will continue to do so in 2021 to enable more women rights defenders to participate in our programme. Justice and Peace has carried out preparatory work in 2020 for the pilot to start in 2021, learning from the experience of our international Shelter City partners and consultations with women rights defenders in our network. Gender-specific risks and strategies are already integrated into all training modules but we will put more emphasis on the impact of risk on families and how family can be included in risk management strategies. As needed or desired we will also expand modules on gender-specific online threats and harassment, and other forms of Gender-Based Violence as relevant for the programme and defenders.

Objective 4: Expand the public support for human rights defenders in The Hague and across the Netherlands by enhancing the social impact of the Shelter City Initiative.

Regarding youth, Justice and Peace aims to make a new generation of young people more human rights conscious through the concept of Shelter City School. Due to COVID-19, the launch of the Shelter City School pilot project has been postponed to 2021. Preparatory activities as well as the identification of partner schools have been carried out in 2020. By providing identified partner schools with educational materials, a guest lecture from an HRD, and a project for the students to complete at the end, Justice and Peace will make human rights more concrete by integrating human rights and the work of HRDs into the school curriculum in the Netherlands. Moreover, emphasis will be placed on the way students can conduct human rights action at a local level to support the work of HRDs.

Justice and Peace will organize events throughout the year featuring HRDs as guest speakers in The Hague and the Netherlands. The events will include lectures, panel discussions, film screenings, or interactive experiences, allowing interaction with the audience and the HRDs. These events will be promoted online via our social channels and websites. In 2021, Justice and Peace plans to organize four to six (online) events in The Hague. In addition, two exhibitions will be held in the Netherlands showcasing the work of HRDs.

1. INTRODUCTION

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Apart from the online training sessions, we have continued to regularly share resources, urgent funds, and other materials relevant for human rights defenders (HRDs) via our online channels and in private social media groups with former guests.⁴

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The Shelter City guests in The Hague were able to get valuable rest and respite, as well as opportunities to extend their network, speak about their work, and receive psychological support. The security training sessions they received focused on digital and organizational security. In preparation of their return, the HRDs received personal guidance as well as a small financial support that enabled them to reintegrate into their situation back home and resume work after return.

On the 14th of October a partial lockdown came into force in the Netherlands, which became a full lockdown in December. All JP staff are working from home again until further notice. Despite the challenges this has posed to the HRDs and our partners, the HRDs have evaluated their stay in the Netherlands positively and underlined the importance of providing safe spaces in these challenging times. Both our partners and the HRDs showed great flexibility

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JP observes a deteriorating human rights situation and an increased crackdown on HRDs and journalists in several EU members states. Therefore JP believes that Shelter City can be relevant for HRDs in the European context as well. Due to the continuous travel restrictions as a result of COVID-19 and the challenges this poses on intercontinental travel, JP has agreed with the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs to open the Shelter City programme to HRDs from Hungary and Poland. For 2021 we plan to further extend our network and call for applications to those countries. Additionally, we will extend our Shelter City programme with two additional places per year for journalists at risk from around the world, who will be hosted in The Hague.

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





Introduction

The overall objective of the Shelter City Initiative is to enable human rights defenders (HRDs) worldwide to protect and promote human rights in a safer and more effective manner, thereby contributing to a safer and more enabling environment for all human rights work. The initiative will be carried out in a similar way as in previous years, offering temporary relocation, rest and respite and capacity building to HRDs for a period of maximum 3 months. Our goal is that the HRDs will return and continue their work in their own country, with new energy, skills and contacts. Security and wellbeing will remain the main focus of our training offer, combined with personalised accompaniment. A gender focus will be further embedded in the programme, by starting a pilot project with family relocation.

To meet the growing demand for temporary relocation, Justice and Peace continuously works on extending the network of Shelter Cities to other European cities, and other regions where the HRDs work. At the same time, we aim to strengthen the collaboration between the current international hubs, by further developing structures for collaboration and by organizing the annual International Shelter City Workshop. We stimulate participating cities to work in alliance with each other to exchange lessons learned, to organize joint public events and to strengthen support to HRDs. Justice and Peace will continue to lobby for national, regional and local policy makers to support the creation of more temporary safe spaces in the Netherlands and abroad.

Additionally, Justice and Peace continues to advocate visa flexibility for HRDs, enabling them to extend their stay in case they are unable to return after the relocation period due to the security situation in their home country.

In 2022, Shelter City will celebrate its 10-year anniversary. In preparation of this, an external consultant will carry out an impact study to showcase the impact and relevance of Shelter City. The results will be published in a report that can be used for external communications purposes for a wider audience.

As in previous years, an important element of Shelter City is to raise awareness about HRDs and their work and to mobilize people to actively support HRDs, contributing to a critical mass that demands policy makers to take action to support HRDs and the space to operate. As in previous years, our main

focus will be on youth in the Netherlands, the future generation of change makers. In our communications outings, we will continue to raise awareness for the stories of HRDs and the threats to their work.

Objectives

Objective 1: Support and protect 5.12.h by offering them temporary relocation to The Hague.

Justice and Peace continues its efforts to carefully screen candidates before their final selection to the programme. From amongst the 500-600 applications we receive annually, we are 5.12.h candidates in one of the 12 Dutch Shelter Cities. We expect to 5.12.h in The Hague.

To a large extent the programme will be carried out in a similar way as in previous years, offering rest and respite and capacity building to HRDs for a period of maximum 3 months, while taking into account all COVID-19 measures. Our goal is for the HRDs to return and continue their work in their own country, with new energy, skills, knowledge and contacts.

Due to COVID-19 we anticipate that we may not be able to reach the intended number of HRDs. Due to the new challenges that COVID-19 poses to our work, Justice and Peace anticipates to spend additional time and costs on logistics and preparation of their stay, adjustments during their stay, support to the HRDs, and possible postponement of return due to COVID-19.

Objective 2: Build the security and long term resilience of 5.12.h and their organisations through an integrated and flexible training programme in order to continue their human rights work in a safer and enabling manner.

With a view to providing a crosscutting and holistic approach of protection, Justice and Peace combines both relocation and capacity building for HRDs. While temporary shelters are necessary and often life-changing for the guests, preparing them to face the challenges waiting for them back home is equally important. To meet those challenges, Justice and Peace wants to strengthen the resilience of 5.12.h at risk - who will be temporarily relocated in one of the 12 Dutch Shelter Cities - through our training

programme. This includes the four HRDs that will be hosted in The Hague. The training will continue to be a pillar of the Shelter City initiative, while finding innovative ways to disseminate the knowledge.

During their 3 month stay in the Netherlands, HRDs will receive a holistic and tailor-made training programme, that entails a wide range of security and protection related topics such as risk management (risk assessment, how to develop security plans), physical security (security in the field, security at the office and at home, dealing with aggression), digital security (secure communication, storage, devices and accounts, preventing phishing and malware), advocacy and policy influencing, wellbeing and body work. The training will address not just issues of individual, organisational and collective security, including preparedness to return after temporary relocation, but also wellbeing strategies to further build resilience. Group sessions on wellbeing are combined with optional individual sessions, to adapt to each HRD's specific needs.

Objective 3: Support and promote the safety of specific vulnerable groups of human rights defenders by further enhancing also the gender perspective of the temporary relocation programme.

In the past years we have identified at risk women human rights defenders who cannot or will not join the programme due to the reality that they have a family to take care of. Therefore, we wish to work towards a setup in which we can host defenders with their dependents in line with the Resolution of the European Parliament on EU policies in favour of HRDs.¹ This enhances the gender perspective of the Shelter City Initiative, specifically by helping more women human rights defenders to benefit from our programme. This implies that Justice and Peace and the city of The Hague (where this pilot for family relocation will take place) would have to provide proper housing and other necessities for families. It also requires for the granting of visa for relocation of HRDs with their dependents, for which Justice and Peace has successfully advocated in the past years. Justice and Peace carries out preparatory work in 2021 for the pilot to start in 2022, learning from the experience of our international Shelter City Hubs and consultations with women rights defenders in our network. Gender specific risks and strategies are already integrated into all training modules but we will put more emphasis on the impact of risk on families and how family can be included in risk management strategies. As needed or desired we will also expand modules on gender specific online threats and harassment, and other forms of Gender Based Violence as relevant for the programme and defenders.

Objective 4: Expand the public support for human rights defenders in The Hague and across the Netherlands by enhancing the social impact of the Shelter City Initiative.

Inspiring and activating youth and local citizens in the Netherlands for human rights is an important aspect of Shelter City. To inspire and connect the general public to the work of HRDs, Justice and Peace will organise events throughout the year featuring HRDs as guest speakers in The Hague and the Netherlands. The events will include film screenings, panel discussions, and interactive experiences that allow interaction with the audience and the HRDs. These events will be promoted online via our online channels, and where appropriate using paid ads and/or offline means such as flyers and

Regarding youth, Justice and Peace aims to make a new generation of young people more human rights conscious through its educational programme. Over the last years, Justice and Peace and its partners have created a network of primary schools, secondary schools, MBO schools, and universities (including universities of applied sciences) in The Hague and throughout the Netherlands and through this it is able to reach many students with different backgrounds. In 2022, Justice and Peace will continue with the educational programme to connect students to the work of HRDs, as the COVID-19 situation currently allows for more in-person meetings.

Alongside events, Justice and Peace will increase outreach in the Netherlands through the use of short film and press. We will support Shelter Cities and actively build relationships with filmmakers in the Netherlands for the creation of short documentaries featuring the HRDs. Cities can decide to host public film screenings or share the short films online and with local target audiences. Regarding press, Justice and Peace will focus on garnering more press attention in the Netherlands to the stories of HRDs and the human rights situations in their countries. We will connect relevant journalists with HRDs with the desired result being news articles or broadcasts in Dutch news.

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vaccination status of the guest and the COVID-situation in the country of residence. JP therefore developed an individual travel programme for each HRD and involved both the HRD and the city in the precautions that had to be taken in their specific situation. JP also adjusted the earlier developed COVID-protocol to the new circumstances and continuously updated the HRDs and the Dutch implementing partners on the changes in regulation. Due to the continuous travel restrictions JP spent more time on logistical preparations.

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In 2021, JP continued to engage with schools in and around The Hague, providing guests the opportunity to give a guest lecture at schools and universities, and engage with students and young people. JP also continued to engage its volunteer network, who met up with the guests for informal and social activities.

The travel and quarantine requirements became more diverse in 2021, based among others on the

The HRDs positively assessed their stay in the Netherlands and highlighted overall that the programme was very useful to them, even in the COVID-19 context. In this second 'COVID-year' it became evident that the Shelter City partners had already adapted to the new situation and easily switched to alternatives modes of working or



organising when needed.

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JP also continued its outreach activities in The Hague and across the Netherlands. In 2021, several HRDs gave guest lectures at educational institutions in and around the Hague. JP and Shelter City guests also organised and/or participated in several events in the 'The Hague-area'. For instance, during the

In the context of the upcoming celebration of 10 years Shelter City in 2022, JP has attracted an external consultant to carry out an evaluation on the impact of the Shelter City initiative. The results of this impact study are expected to be published early 2022.

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


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Security training sessions

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In the 5.1.2.h we were fortunate to be able to continue in-person security and protection trainings for the defenders. Although certain

adjustments had to be made due to the rapid changes in COVID-19 restrictions, we were able to retain many similar elements from the previous training round with a focus on digital and holistic security, policy influencing, and selfcare. Being able to have in-person trainings afforded the defenders the opportunity to actively engage and build human connection after a difficult period of lockdowns and isolation. The trainings allowed defenders to take valuable lessons from the experiences and work of

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programme by working with new and existing external trainers and finding new courses to match the growing needs of defenders, such as creative media, art for wellbeing, and expanding our range of bodywork sessions. Following the launch of the alumni community platform and a dedicated page for resources on the Shelter City website in 2021, we have continued promoting capacity-building and resilience through resources even after the defenders have returned to their home countries.



Over the past years, Justice & Peace has identified HRDs at risk (specifically women HRDs) who couldn't participate in the Shelter City initiative due to their role as caretaker of dependents. We have therefore started working on a setup in which human rights defenders could take part in our initiative together with dependents (family relocation), thereby further enhancing our inclusiveness towards HRDs (specifically women) with dependents. JP has also convened meetings with several partner organisations to share experiences and lessons learned with regards to family relocation.



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

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
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
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Capacity Building

For human rights defenders, participating in the Shelter City means an opportunity to build capacity on addressing challenging human rights issues and learning to remain resilient despite stress and pressure. Between 2020 and 2022 we organised a total of 30 training days for the human rights defenders stayed in the Netherlands.

Capacity building programmes were carried out in both in-person and in some cases also online or hybrid to accommodate COVID-19 measures. Topics covered throughout the years covered to build knowledge and skill bases to effectively address human rights issues, such as campaign, advocacy, data literacy, human rights mechanisms, transitional justice, communications, networking, media training and fundraising. Furthermore, topics relevant to strengthen resilience included digital and physical security, self-care, trauma sensitivity, self-defence, and body work.

All capacity building related activities were evaluated with the human rights defenders, trainers and staff, to improve them each time for future guests. We aim to remain attentive to the feedback and build a flexible and tailored programme for human rights defenders coming to the Shelter City.

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Objective 3: Family relocation



Support and promote the safety of specific vulnerable groups of human rights defenders by further enhancing also the gender perspective of the temporary relocation programme.

Over the past years, Justice & Peace has identified human rights defenders at risk (specifically women human rights defenders) who could not participate in the Shelter City initiative due to their role in the family, often as a caretaker or sole breadwinner of their dependents.. Justice & Peace therefore started working on a setup in which human rights defenders could take part in our initiative together with dependents (family relocation), thereby further enhancing our inclusiveness towards human rights defenders (specifically women) with dependents. Justice & Peace also convened meetings with several partner organisations to share experiences and lessons learned with regards to family relocation.

Despite receiving official approval for family relocation focused on women human rights defenders in 2021, suitable candidate(s) for the pilot have yet to be identified. We continue to expand our efforts in identifying suitable candidate(s) for the family relocation pilot and hope to be able to begin this in 2023. We did, however, already gain experience with hosting a family in our emergency relocation programme funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The lessons learned provide valuable insights that can be applied when hosting families in The Hague in the future.





Objective 4: **Public education & outreach**

Expand the public support for human rights defenders in The Hague and across the Netherlands by enhancing the social impact of the Shelter City Initiative.

Despite COVID-19 measures and restrictions in the last few years, we were able to continue and expand our outreach activities, create new collaborations, and meet and inspire new supporters in The Hague and across the Netherlands thanks to the support of the municipality of The Hague. 2022 in particular also marked a milestone year as we celebrated the 10th anniversary of Shelter City The Hague, of which many of the events and communications activities this year have been connected to.





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
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

III. The context we are working in

Everyone has human rights. But not everyone gets to enjoy them. Amid the global pandemic and widespread political upheaval, a growing number of people globally are living in countries with significant restrictions to their human rights. Reports of an unfolding human rights and climate crisis prevail for over a decade now,² but hopes for a better world are kept alive by courageous individuals, social movements and civil society organisations who are pushing barriers to make a positive change for human rights and climate in their societies. The efforts of those human rights defenders? Vital. The restrictions they face? Numerous. That is why empowering them to continue their work is fundamental.

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

IV. Our plan for 2023-2025

For 10 years, we have strongly stood side by side with human rights defenders at risk through our Shelter City in The Hague. Human rights defenders spend three months in a safe space in the city of peace and justice, they re-energize, receive tailor-made support and engage with allies in order to reinforce their local actions for change back home.

But Shelter City The Hague is not only a safe space for human rights defenders. The Hague's multicultural community and diverse network of organizations, policy makers, students and justice workers makes The Hague an inspiring space for human rights defenders, as well as its citizens and local actors. It is a space where connections, collaborations and synergies emerge across different actors in the city for the protection of human rights and human rights defenders. Volunteers from all walks of life form active support networks for the human rights defenders, and come in solidarity for human rights issues globally, but also in their own city. For the municipality itself, Shelter City is a solidarity movement of cities in the Netherlands and abroad who stand side by side with human rights defenders and showcase how human rights action at the local level contributes to vital changes on human rights issues globally.

2022 was a year of celebration and reflection on 10 years of Shelter City The Hague. For a decade now, The Hague has been an inspiration for other cities to join the global movement of protection and support for human rights defenders. And our plan for the next three years is to continue leading by example from The Hague. From 2023 we will start a new period, nurturing our best practices and putting into action our lessons learned. By collaborating with old and new partners, a longer term commitment allows us to gain space to reinvent our work, harmonize resources and join efforts to further strengthen our support for human rights defenders in The Hague.

Multi-annual goal 1: Shelter City The Hague provides temporary safe and inspiring spaces for human rights defenders at risk where they re-energise, receive tailor-made support, and engage with local allies

To achieve this we:

Empower human rights defenders to feel protected, recognised, and part of a larger community during their temporary relocation in The Hague:

- By hosting ^{5.1.2.b} annually in The Hague.
- By providing a tailor-made programme and personalized accompaniment for human rights defenders at risk in The Hague. Justice & Peace maintains the coordination and supervision of the implementation in The Hague and provides advice to partners to guarantee the quality of the programme.

Enhance the gender perspective of the temporary relocation programme to further promote and support the safety of women human rights defenders:





- By implementing a family relocation programme in The Hague which provides necessary accompaniment for (women) human rights defenders and relevant necessities for their dependents.
- By further developing and integrating gender specific strategies and modules in our training modules and tailor-made programme.

Throughout the next three years, Justice & Peace aims to continue 5.1.2h defenders annually in The Hague. The human rights defenders will be selected by an independent Selection Committee, who assess a detailed longlist of applicants. They create a shortlist of human rights defenders at risk, who are subsequently interviewed to determine their needs. Once the final selection of human rights defenders is made, they are matched to a city in the Netherlands – including The Hague.

To a large extent, the programme will be carried out in a similar way as in previous years, offering rest and respite and capacity building to human rights defenders for a period of maximum 3 months. During their stay, each human rights defender receives accommodation, a stipend and personalized accompaniment by a local mentor and volunteer group. We also offer them personalized medical support, including psychosocial support to overcome traumas, burnout, and sometimes depression due to their work. While in collaboration with educational institutions in The Hague we can continue offering educational classes (such as language or human right courses) to human rights defenders based on their needs.

Our goal is for the human rights defenders to return and continue their work in their own country, with new energy, skills, knowledge and contacts. For that reason we provide capacity building on digital and physical security, wellbeing, advocacy, networking and communications, as further detailed under multi-annual goal 2. We will further develop our capacity building trainings with an additional emphasis on women specific trainings and building in conflict sensitivity, which goes hand in hand with the continuation of implementing family relocation in The Hague. During the previous multi-annual grant period Justice & Peace piloted family relocation in The Hague, as the first city to offer this in the Netherlands. In this new multi-annual plan we aim to annually 5.1.2h

5.1.2h in The Hague to continue enhancing the gender perspective of Shelter City The Hague. The family will be supported with relevant travel arrangements, and provided with a suitable accommodation in The Hague. Where necessary medical costs, including psychosocial support, will be provided to the dependents of the human rights defender also, while the programme will facilitate necessary work conditions for the human rights defender as needed, such as day-care for underaged dependents.

Multi-annual goal 2: Human rights defenders ensure the wellbeing and safety of themselves and others and the effectiveness of their work.

To achieve this we:

Strengthen the resilience and capacities of human rights defenders during relocation in order to continue their work more safely and effectively after returning home:





- By enhancing the individual, organisational and collective security of the human rights defenders through our tailor-made holistic security training.
- By supporting the development of new skills through the provision of additional on-demand trainings in collaboration with external experts or organizations.
- By improving their wellbeing through bodywork, group sessions combined with individual sessions with experts.

Improving security and well-being practices remains an essential part of the three-month temporary relocation period, which is why we further introduce innovative capacity building activities for the human rights defenders who are part of Shelter City programme over the next three years. In addition to our existing trainings on holistic security, advocacy and psychosocial support, a new focus will be added on capacities to communicate more effectively (online and offline), to build and maintain financial and operational stability, to form more collaborations that will help in advancing their human rights work more effectively, to address emerging human rights issues, and to analyze human rights issues more strategically.

During the trainings well-being sessions are included and best practices are shared with the human rights defenders. Human rights defenders tend to put their cause above their own wellbeing, which is why we organize wellbeing sessions to remind them that their own well-being is indispensable for continuing their work. Together with the human rights defender, we assess their needs to improve their wellbeing where needed. Many human rights

Multi-annual goal 3: Shelter Cities contribute to strengthening recognition, building allies and generating respect for human rights defenders in the Hague, the Netherlands and abroad.

Enhance the visibility of human rights defenders and the positive impact of their work among Dutch and international public in The Hague:

- By sharing the stories of human rights defenders via online channels, press and short documentaries.
- By organising and promoting online and offline events featuring human rights defenders in The Hague. Events include film screenings, panel discussions, lectures, and interactive experiences which will allow interactions between the audience and the human rights defenders.
- By connecting human rights defenders to journalists, resulting in news articles or broadcasts in Dutch news outlets and channels.



- By providing educational institutions with materials, guest lectures from human rights defenders, and project concepts for the students to work on with the human rights defenders.

Justice & Peace together with our partners in The Hague plays a role in the recognition and support of human rights defenders.

In 2023, we aim to use more creative and interactive ways to build ally networks and raise awareness amongst our target audiences in The Hague. This does not only help human rights defenders themselves to raise necessary awareness, recognition and support for the continuation of their work, but it also provides an opportunity for citizens of The Hague to expand their knowledge and scope on human rights in different countries around the world, it encourages more solidarity and indirectly contributes to building further social cohesion in The Hague.

Attention will be given to generating press, in particular local and national television broadcasts in the form of short documentaries in order to reach and connect as many people across The Hague and the Netherlands. Through events, social media and online channels Justice & Peace can foster the building of local allies in The Hague and reach more people.
